Manchester Pride 2012

The focus of this issue will be around the various activities the University will be involved with as part of the Manchester Pride festival. The highlight for many will be the University's first entry in the Parade since 2007 which will take place on Saturday 25 August through Manchester City Centre. At the time of going to press, over 90 people will walk under the banner of The University of Manchester including staff, students, family and friends—many of whom aren't LGBT themselves but are proud to support the University and its LGBT community.

On 28 July, some of the participants in this year's parade gathered with Prof. Dame Nancy Rothwell (Vice-President and Chancellor) and Karen Heaton (Director of Human Resources and LGBT Staff Network Champion) to launch the University's involvement and demonstrate the commitment of the Senior Leadership Team to equality.

"Queer'd Science"

The theme for the Manchester Pride Parade this year is 'Queer'd Science' to mark the centenary of Alan Turing. Turing was instrumental in the cracking of the Enigma Code during World War II and is regarded as a pioneer in the development of the computer. He worked at The University of Manchester from 1948 until his death in 1954.

The recitals, which are now in their fifth year, celebrate LGBT composers and feature internationally renowned performers as well as young, local talent. This year's five concerts include performances from the exceptionally versatile baritone Roderick Williams, the supremely talented Heath Quartet, the wonderful Aquinas Piano Trio, young and vibrant pianist Daniel Browell and the charismatic mezzo CN Lester, with guitarist Toby Carr.

The recitals will feature music by Tchaikovsky, Britten, Schubert, Saint-Saens, Tippett, Ireland and Somervell as well as the world premiere of a new piece by Manchester Pride's very own Composer-in-Association, Marc Yeats. The concerts on 21 & 23 August will be recorded by BBC Radio 3 for future broadcast.
