NEW REGULATIONS FOR WORKPLACE PENSIONS

In October, we told you that the Government had just introduced a new way for people not already in a pension to build up their own pension.

The new law requires all employers to begin enrolling eligible workers automatically into a workplace pension scheme.

This will help them to build up their own pension to top up the basic State Pension when they stop working.

If you are among the majority of University staff who already belong to a pension scheme (USS, UMSS, GMPF or NHSPS), you won't be affected by this change - and you won't need to do anything.

On 1 March 2013, the University will begin enrolling eligible workers automatically in pension schemes. The Pensions Office will write to you as soon as possible after this date to confirm either:

(a) that we have enrolled you into a workplace pension because you were eligible

(b) that we have taken no action because you were already saving for a pension or were not eligible to be enrolled automatically.

Of course, if you aren't currently saving for your own pension, you can apply to join a pension scheme at any time by contacting the Pensions Office at:

You should ask your line manager to make an application on your behalf, but if s/he feels unable to support the case, you may make a personal application.

Applications for academic related and support staff should be made by Friday 1 February 2013. The timetable for applications from academic staff is set locally.

PRESIDENT'S UPDATE

18 October 2012

At a Siemens event in London for their selected university partners, the President received the award of 'ambassador' status alongside Cambridge in recognition of our close research collaborations and the recruitment of our graduates.

25 October 2012

This week, the President spoke at the official launch of our new School of Arts, Languages and Cultures. Later in the week, our annual Foundation Day celebration marked the foundation of The University of Manchester in 2004 with a talk by Foundation Lecturer, Clive Anderson, comedian, presenter and accomplished barrister, and an honorary degree ceremony took place where honorary doctorates were bestowed on Sir Fazle Hasan Abed, Sir Philip Craven, Mick Hucknall, Dame Kathleen Ollerenshaw and John Timpson.



1 November 2012

The President reported that we have been awarded almost £13 million of funding by the HEFCE UK Research Partnership Investment Fund for the University's new cancer building which will be located on The Christie site.

8 November 2012

The President spoke at the official opening of our James Chadwick Building, which is the first phase of new buildings to re-house the School of Chemical Engineering and Analytical Sciences. She reported that home/EU undergraduate (UG) admissions are down on target, overseas recruitment at UG level is slightly up, but we are also down on postgraduate taught (PGT) numbers.



TEAM UP TO MAKE A GREEN IMPACT

If you're interested in helping the University become more environmentally sustainable, why not sign up to the Green Impact scheme?

Green Impact encourages staff and students to make changes to the way they work and study – all with the aim of helping the University become a little bit greener.

Each team receives a workbook and can sign up to a bronze, silver, gold or platinum plan. The whole process is clear and easy to follow and there's support on hand to help you achieve your targets.

At the end of the academic year there's an awards ceremony to recognise your efforts and help put you in touch with other people working on similar projects.

There are currently 32 Green Impact teams at the University.

In 2011/12, teams from Compliance and Risk, The Manchester Museum, and the Geochemistry Lab all succeeded integrating small actions into their day-to-day operations.

Their tips for this year's participants are:

- Work towards developing a work culture around sustainability in your department
- Try to engage or familiarise senior management with your sustainability plans.

GRETA SANTAGATA

Faculty of Life Sciences Intern, Manchester Graduate Internship Programme

The Manchester Graduate Internship Programme (MGIP), managed by the Careers and Employability Division, helps our graduates get that all important first job after they leave university.

Most MGIP graduates work in a variety of businesses and organisations across Manchester, but a few are able to secure internships within the University itself. Greta applied through the programme and two months ago started working in the Faculty of Life Sciences for a year producing podcasts.

Greta came to Manchester from Italy five years ago to study for a BSc (Hons) in Neuroscience. After her undergraduate studies, she started a PhD. However she realised that her real interest lay in science communication after starting her own blog. Greta was shortlisted for The Guardian and Wellcome Trust Science Writing Prize 2012 and she is hoping to be awarded an MPhil in January.





Her interest in producing podcasts began as a hobby. Greta says: "I set up a small studio at home, and interviewed friends just for fun really. It gave me the chance to learn more technical skills such as editing and mixing."

Greta produces a podcast every two weeks, and she's responsible for everything, from deciding a theme and arranging interviews to mastering the content in the recording suite. She says: "My aim is to make the podcasts accessible to as wide an audience as possible – and I don't just highlight life sciences, I feature other disciplines if it's an idea or subject that I think would work. In fact, I've just interviewed Dr Tim O'Brien from Jodrell Bank Observatory who talked about the Moon. It's an ideal platform for scientists to communicate their research, and even students who want to get more experience in front of the camera."

A recent podcast looked at how light therapy benefits people who suffer from SAD (Seasonal Affective Disorder). A student talked about her experience of using light therapy, and a scientist explained the theory behind it. The follow-up focused on how the autumn season affects the natural world, when the leaves change colour and animals go into hibernation.

Greta is also busy planning her new Sunday night show on the student radio station, Fuse FM. She says: "Ideally, I'd love to work in radio in the future - although I'm more interested in what goes on behind the scenes, especially research, producing or editing."

Although she's only two months into her internship, Greta can see the benefits already. "I'm taking every opportunity this year to do as much as I can to build my portfolio, develop skills, and explore all possibilities. I am enjoying it so much – and can't believe how much I am learning! I feel so grateful to have been given this chance – I actually look forward to coming to work on Mondays!"

Greta is on the lookout for any ideas for future podcasts from across the University. "Our website is now up and running so we're hoping to get lots more hits as we add more content."
