The internet is your friend. Make a profile on academia.edu. Link all your

public-facing profiles together, keep them updated.

If you ask a question after a speaker's paper (during the Q & A)

at a conference, it breaks the ice and makes it easier to go speak

to them one on one after the session

Email people you want to meet at conferences and arrange a meeting

in advance. Reach out to people. A polite, directed email isn't a hassle

for anyone. Send thank you notes or messages to peers and academics

who give you good advice, spared some time to mentor you or sent

you a reading list. Ask for good advice, mentoring and reading lists.

Engage in reading groups & talk about your research with peers

Browse the net for people with similar interests, read their work and get in contact with them

Always be bold, everyone goes to conferences for the same reason. If you have contact with another academic department (i.e. through teaching or one of your supervisors) always make the most of this connection as it widens your net in terms of research/teaching/employment opportunities.
