The national Higher Education research assessment exercise takes place every seven years and a successful Research Excellence Framework (or REF) result at the end of this year will inform the level of Quality-related funding to the University for the following seven years (currently £600m). In addition to this is the substantial reputational impact the result will have over the same period. It is the single largest research administration exercise undertaken that is not permanently resourced and all of the members of this team stepped outside the conventional structures and worked together to support Unit of Assessment (UoA) coordinators and senior academic management to produce a return worthy of our researcher's achievements.
