Wolverhampton £7,670


Fees

Who can do the course?

Annual recruitment of 9-12 students

Applicants are normally required to have:

- a 2:1 honours degree or above from a BPS recognised undergraduate degree allowing for Graduate Basis for Chartered Membership (GBC) with the British Psychological Society (BPS)
- a Certificate in Counselling or equivalent qualification
- the capacity to undertake research to Doctoral level
- English GCSE grade C or above, or IELTS 7.5 or above with a minimum of 7.0 in each separate sub-category (if English is not the first language)
- Satisfactory Criminal Convictions Check
- The ability for critical and constructive self reflection

Doctorate in Counselling Psychology

General Info

- 3 Year Full Time Doctorate in Counselling Psychology
- Approved by the Health and Care Professions Council (HCPC) and accredited by the British Psychological Society (BPS)

Four key elements:

- Theory
- Practice
- Research
- Personal Development

Theory

- Research informed integrative approach
 - Harnessing framework Pluralistic Framework/The Skilled Helper
 - Theory 1 Humanistic Counselling
 - Theory 2 Cognitive Behavioural Therapy

Emphasis upon:

- Humanistic psychology
- Tailored therapeutic response: What works for whom?
- Reflexive practice: the importance of clinical supervision
- Integration of research into everyday practice

Practice

- 450 hours of supervised clinical work (ratio 1:8)
- Minimum of two client groups and two modalities
- Placement links include third sector organisations, NHS providers, private organisations

(nb. clinical placements are also potential research settings)

Placement Expectations

- Meet HCPC, BPS and University requirements (e.g. health & safety, equality and diversity policies, adequate number of experienced staff)
- Allotted Practice Educator (CV to be submitted to university and the person must attend course briefing)
- Clinical Supervisor (CV to be submitted to university and the person must attend course briefing)
- One placement visit at least per year + (Pre-placement visit for new placements)

Assessment and Progression


Assignments

- Year 1: Counselling Psychology: theory, practice and research (Total: 17,000 words)
 - Theoretical paper and professional issues presentation
 - Research proposal and ethical clearance
 - Case study and process report Documentary evidence of practice (50 hours) and personal therapy (10 hours)
- Year 2: Counselling Psychology: advanced theory, practice and research (Total: 18,000 words)
 - Theoretical paper and professional issues presentation
 - Systematic review
 - Case study and process report
 - Documentary evidence of practice (250 hours) and personal therapy (25 hours)
- Year 3: Research Thesis Preparation (Total: 50,000 words)
 - Research thesis and present preliminary findings at research conference
 - Documentary evidence of practice (450 hours) and personal therapy (40 hours)
 - Reflexive essay and completed SoP log

Progression

In addition to successfully completing academic assignments, throughout Years 1 to 3, students will also have to complete progression panels related to their therapeutic practice and research. This will include:

- initial fitness to practise review prior to commencement of first placement
- formal analysis of therapeutic practice (annually)
- regular review of the evidence of completion of the HCPC's Standards of Proficiency (annually)
- a research plan presentation (end of Year 1)
- a research progress panel (end of Year 2)



The recruitment process

Assessment will take place through:

- Application form
 - Including statement of purpose covering practice and professional/ personal development
- References
- Individual Interview
- Assessment activities
 - Review of written work (during interview)
 - Individual Presentation
 - Group Activity
