

EU Student Funding for Living Costs

At the time of writing there has been confirmation from the UK Government that European Union (EU) students for academic year 2020/21 will continue to receive financial support and 'home' fee status. What costs will I need to consider before starting a qualification?

1. Tuition Fees – the amount of tuition fees you will pay depends on several factors – what you are studying, the level and duration of your study and more. Remember that tuition fees will need to be paid for each academic year of your course and if you are a PhD student, you will need to pay for your writing up year also. Whether you are an Undergraduate, Masters or Doctoral student, you may qualify for a tuition fee loan from Student Finance. Otherwise, you can pay your tuition fees in full at the start of the year or in 3 equal instalments (if paying by instalments, you will need to open a UK bank account and set up a Direct Debit - you cannot register at the University without having done this). 2. Living Costs – once your tuition fees have been covered, you then need to think about everything else! Accommodation, food, bills, mobile phone, internet and travel costs all need to be factored in when planning for your studies. It is important that you do not commence a course without having made adequate provision for both tuition fees and living costs.

How can I meet these costs?

There are many options to funding a qualification at the University of Manchester and this guide aims to outline many of these for your consideration. Ideally you should begin researching your options 12-18 months in advance and start applying for funding 6-12 months before your course begins (however, if you find that you are experiencing unforeseen financial difficulties once you have

commenced your studies, it is usually still possible to apply for funding).

Self-funding

Many students fund their studies through a combination of savings (either their own or via help from family members) and part-time work. You may wish to consider the option of taking a year out before your studies in order to work and save some money and then work part-time alongside your studies to keep this ticking over. Residential Pastoral Adviser Employment

The University employs many mature or postgraduate students to work in its Halls of Residence as Residential Life Advisers. Using your own experience of University life, you will be required to work in a team providing pastoral support and guidance to residents (which also sometimes includes matters of a disciplinary nature). In return you will be provided with accommodation paid for by the University in the Hall itself. You also do not have to pay for any bills (i.e. electricity, water, internet access) however if you obtain a position in a catered Hall of Residence, you will have to pay for your food.

Teaching Assistant Employment/Tutoring

If you are a PhD student, check with your department if they have any teaching assistant vacancies – you could also apply for these positions at other local Universities. Government Postgraduate (Masters) Loans Scheme

Please find below a summary of the Government's PG Loans Scheme:

- Up to £11,222 for the 2020/21 academic year.
- Taught and Research Masters only (including MBA) - does not include Diploma studies.
- Available to full-time, part-time (at least 50% of a full-time course) and Distance Learners.
- The loan is considered to be a contribution towards the costs of PG study and is not available if you already have a Masters qualification.
- You will follow the same repayment scheme as

undergraduate Student Finance loans (the Income Contingent scheme) with repayments beginning 6th April following the academic year that the course is completed (you can make voluntary payments before if you wish). Repayments will be made concurrently with UG loans at a rate of 6% of everything you earn over £21,000.

- *Interest will be RPI + 3%.*
- *Age limit: 60 or under.*
- *Payments are made in three instalments throughout the academic year—33%/33%/34%*
- *EU students may be able to apply for these loans subject to having been resident in England for at least 3 years prior to the start of your PG course (periods of residency which are purely for the purpose of education will not count towards this 3 year requirement).*

Government Doctoral Loans Scheme

The government offers doctoral loans of up to £26,445 for PhD programmes, to help with living costs and fees. It is paid in three instalments each year.

To qualify you must:

- *Be under 60*
- *Studying a stand-alone doctoral course which lasts from 3 to 8 academic years*
- *Have started on or after 1 August 2018*
- *Have been ordinarily resident in the EEA or Switzerland for the past 3 years*

School of Study (UG and PG)

As a first stop, we would advise you to contact your School of study to enquire about any subject or discipline-specific scholarships they may offer. Your School will also be able to advise you about any tuition fee discounts (sometimes known as a Loyalty Bursary).

Alternative Guide to Postgraduate Funding (applies to Undergraduate and Postgraduate students!)

The University also subscribes to The Alternative Guide to Postgraduate Funding publication as a source of information regarding alternative ways to fund your studies.

Written by students who have been through the process of applying for funding themselves (securing over £45,000 in the process), the Alternative Guide is available free of charge for all current and prospective students.

Don't be put off by the title if you are an undergraduate student however! The Alternative Guide provides details of funding sources which apply regardless of your study level and nationality.

The advisory section of the guide concentrates on how to make a strong application and gives information about writing a winning supporting statement. The remainder of the guide contains contact details of hundreds of charities, grant making trusts and educational trusts located in an easy to use, intuitive funding database.

Tips:

- *Ensure that any funds are awarded on the basis that they will be renewed annually.*
- *It is also in your (potential) supervisor's interest to help you to secure funding – don't be afraid to ask them for help in making applications!*
- *Don't pin all your hopes on one source of funding – apply to as many organisations as possible (even the most obscure ones!). You may not receive one large award however you could receive several smaller awards (the average award per organisation is £500).*
- *It will involve a lot of work on your part however we have had success stories!*

Sponsorship
