# Annual Report of Student Appeals, Student Complaints and Student Discipline Cases 2015-16<sup>1</sup>

### **Section 1: Executive summary**

The Annual Report details the number and nature of cases handled each academic year by Faculties and Professional Support Services (PSS) and is required under the Regulations for the relevant areas. The data reported below relate only to formal cases and do not include the significant number of cases which are resolved informally by Schools and PSS Directorates.<sup>2</sup>

The <u>overall number</u> of Faculty (or equivalent) cases across the different Regulations (562 in 2015/16) remains similar to that in 2014/15 (537) and represents a small proportion of the total student population. In relation to complaints there has been a rise in the total number being considered at Faculty level. The total number of appeals has remained at a similar level to 2014/15 but, of note within that case category, there has been a rise in UG appeals. Disciplinary activity has remained similar to 2014/15, but there has been a rise in cases of unauthorised material in examinations and a rise in cases of non-academic misconduct.

In June 2014, Senate agreed an <u>amendment to Regulation XVII: Student Conduct and Discipline</u> to extend the application of the Regulation to student behaviour off-campus. During 2015/16 the Director of Student Life met informally with 109 students in relation to off-campus behaviour; no further action was taken against 25, warning letters were issued to 79 and five students (living in a shared house) were referred to the University Student Disciplinary Panel (USDP). The five students referred to the USDP were the first students to have been taken to the USDP for this type of misconduct; all five were initially excluded but, at appeal, two students received alternative penalties.

There has been a large decrease in the number of students progressing complaints to the <u>Office of the Independent Adjudicator</u> (OIA): 12 complaints in 2015/16 compared with 38 complaints in 2014/15. This decrease may be linked to the OIA's increased timeframe for submitting complaints (12 months following a University reaching Completion of Procedures rather than three months).

During 2015/16 we will continue to work with Faculties and other colleagues to consider the 'lessons learned' from cases and to provide staff training and development in relation to the handling of appeals and complaints. It should also be noted that colleagues from the Faculty of Science and Engineering (FSE) have been reviewing the appeals, complaints and discipline function across the Faculty and that the Faculty of Biology, Medicine and Health (BMH) are continuing to work on harmonising the case handling practices from the former Faculty of Life Sciences (FLS) and Faculty of Medical and Human Sciences.

This report covers 1<sup>st</sup> October 2015 to 30<sup>th</sup> September 2016. Cases that have been recorded against FLS have still been presented in the Report but from the date of the merger (1<sup>st</sup> August 2016) will have been incorporated into the data for BMH and FSE.



There was large increase in the number of complaints. The reason for this is unclear. Within these figures, one of the more notable rises was in relation to harassment/discrimination/bullying complaints (eight in 2015/16 compared with five in 2014/15); case handlers have reported that complaints of this nature have started to include issues arising in students' private lives.

The upheld complaint leading to financial redress resulted in the student being given a £2,100 fee refund. The student whose case was referred to another part of the University also had their complaint upheld and was given £1,800 compensation.

### Review of Faculty (or equivalent) decision

19 students (compared with 17 in 2014/15) requested a review of their complaints by the Director of Teaching and Learning Support (Regulation XVIII, paragraphs 23-25).

Compared with 2014/15, 2015/16 had the same number of cases of decisions being amended on review, with outcomes including:

- A referral back to a Faculty for reconsideration;
- An apology for miscommunication about tuition fee payment and a re-arrangement of the timeframe for making payment;
- An apology for the incorrect application of PGR policy, recommendations for the School, and an offer of £500 compensation (not accepted);
- Apologies and a recommendation that a School reviews aspects of a complaint pertaining to publication of course material, lecturer absence and placement support.


Of particular note, two complaints which were not upheld overall still resulted in offers of £1,000 and £1,500 compensation; the former for confusion pertaining to a student's enforced interruption and the latter due to a large delay and process errors affecting a Faculty's investigation into a complaint. Both offers were not accepted by the students and both chose to submit complaints to the OIA.

Students who either make a dignity at work and study complaint or are the respondent to one, may request a review of a Faculty's decision. Six review requests were received in 2015/16 (compared to three in 2014/15); in five the original decision was upheld and one resulted in a referral back to a Faculty for reconsideration based on new evidence that had been presented.

After the review stage, the University of Manchester procedures are completed and students are issued with a Completion of Procedures letter, as required by the Office of the Independent Adjudicator.

Overall there has been a slight decrease in academic appeals across the University but it should be noted that in 2014/15 one Faculty (Humanities) logged 130 cases of which 42 were dealt with as a group appeal. Appeals within FSE have also decreased (117 2014/15, 100 2015/16). BMH has seen a rise in cases (73 2014/15, 119 2015/16). The number of UG students appealing has increased from 190 in 2014/15 to 234 in 2015/16 whilst PGT appeals have decreased from 105 in 2014/15 to 53 in 2015/16 (but this is accounted for in part by the group appeal in Humanities as referenced above).

The number of grounds quoted fell significantly from 526 in 2014/15 to 357 in 2015/16. The total from 2014/15 would seem to have been linked to the 42 student group appeal in Humanities which accounted for 168 grounds for appeal being quoted. Submissions relating to mitigating circumstances still remain the most prominent grounds for appeal overall.

The total number of academic appeals taken to review decreased slightly from 56 in 2014/15 to 48 in 2015/16. The largest growth in cases being taken to review was seen in FSE (17 2014/15, 23 2015/16) whilst decreases were seen in Humanities (22 2014/15, 13 2015/16) and BMH (16 2014/15, 10 2015/16).


In cases where the appeal is upheld or partially upheld, the University's objective is to place that student back in the position that they would have been in had the subject matter of the appeal not arisen. In one of the partially dismissed outcomes, a referral back to the Faculty was made as the full appeals process had not been completed. In the second it was recommended that a mark penalty be removed from an assessment as the penalty was not referred to in the programme handbook and was not linked to the intended learning outcomes for the assessment.

In 2014/15 four cases were upheld compared with nine in 2015/16. In these cases:

- A student was allowed to repeat a unit of assessment as an administrative error had allowed the student to pick a subject for the assessment without having the necessary pre-requisites;
- A late disability diagnosis was accepted and led to the student being allowed back onto their Programme;
- A student was unable to engage with the interruption process and so a reconsideration of a retrospective interruption took place;
- A case was referred back to a Faculty for reconsideration as the case handler felt that the Faculty did not obtain enough evidence to reach the conclusion to dismiss the appeal.

After the review stage, the University of Manchester procedures are completed and students are issued with a Completion of Procedures letter, as required by the Office of the Independent Adjudicator.

In 2015/16 the number of Faculty cases has remained at a similar level to 2014/15. Plagiarism remains the largest proportion of academic malpractice cases. International students are the most likely demographic of students to be involved in instances of academic malpractice. Notably in relation to possession of unauthorised material, SDP cases have increased from 33 in 2014/15 to 60 in 2015/16 with the majority of students being international.

The USDP has seen a rise in cases relating to non-academic misconduct (16 in 2015/16 compared to one in 2014/15). Types of misconduct under this category include threatening behaviour, off-campus misconduct, harassment and dishonesty. Five cases of non-academic misconduct related to off-campus behaviour and five related to allegations of harassment. The Division of Student Life (policy owner for Regulation XVII) has identified that a Non-Academic Procedure (similar to the Academic Malpractice Procedure) is required to outline process on how cases falling under this category are handled. This is currently being developed.

One student was excluded during 2014/15 but this rose to eight in 2015/16. Five of the exclusions related to off-campus misconduct and the other four for a range of other serious types of misconduct or malpractice. The data also indicates male UG students as the most likely demographic of students to be referred to the USDP and which is also reflected in the penalties imposed.

In relation to off-campus behaviour, the University has been working proactively to reduce the number of noise complaints. The focus of this work is on developing students' understanding of the mixed community that they live in, and their understanding the consequences of antisocial behaviour. Initiatives have been informed by the outputs from a workshop with students who had been through the off-campus disciplinary process in the 2015/16 academic year, and include year-round messaging and targeted campaigns ahead of anticipated spike points. A key development this year has been to work collaboratively with the Students' Union, for example to pilot an initiative targeted at the "Top 10 Streets" for noise complaints.

### **School Cases**

Except in severe cases, Schools tend to handle instances of first offence UG and PGT malpractice or non-academic misconduct cases. During 2014/15 Schools reported handling at least 576 cases; this decreased to at most 372 cases during 2015/16.

The TLSO requests data from Schools on the cases heard by them for inclusion in this report. The data<sup>9</sup> collected from the Schools that responded are as detailed below; at the time of writing we are awaiting data from four Schools<sup>10</sup>. A full breakdown of School-by-School data will be presented to the Student Conduct and Discipline Committee (SCDC) in February 2017 and will also be shared with the Vice-Deans for additional review.

Plagiarism remains the most common type of misconduct that Schools investigate. Cases of collusion have seen a reduction from 180 in 2014/15 to 31 in 2015/16. The majority of students are still found guilty in such cases with the most utilised penalty being a mark of zero for a particular piece of work.

In the cases where the original decision was varied/rescinded:

- 1. The Faculty level case was upheld as a result of new information presented by the student and resulted in a referral back to the Faculty for reconsideration;
- 2. The School level case was resolved prior to the consideration of the student's appeal as the School decided to allow a reassessment opportunity which the student accepted;
- 3. All nine USDP appeals related to expulsion. Of the three upheld, the students presented new information which led to revised penalties being imposed from a combination of voluntary service, suspension and undertakings.

The TLSO has reported to the Student Conduct and Discipline Committee on feedback arising from appeals.

After the appeal stage, the University of Manchester procedures are completed and students are issued with a Completion of Procedures letter, as required by the Office of the Independent Adjudicator.

### Section 6: Commentary on Fitness to Practise 12

Fitness to Practise cases originate in the Faculty of Biology, Medicine and Health (BMH) because of the nature of the programmes of study undertaken in that Faculty. Fitness to Practise cases can arise for a variety of reasons, which often relate to matters of health and professional conduct. BMH School Health and Conduct Committees have the power to refer a student to a Fitness to Practise Committee. The Faculty is currently undertaking a review of the Procedure for a Committee on Fitness to Practise (http://documents.manchester.ac.uk/Doculnfo.aspx?DocID=23997).

A variety of outcomes may result from a Fitness to Practise hearing ranging from warnings to expulsion. No students were found to be not fit to practise during 2015/16 compared with six during 2014/15.


Two appeals were submitted to the Director of Teaching and Learning Support. Appeals can be made on grounds of disproportionate outcome, procedural irregularity and availability of new evidence. Of the two appeals only one was upheld on the basis of new evidence and resulted in a number of conditions such as undertaking a period of interruption, being assessed as fit to study prior to returning to study and being referred to a future Fitness to Practise Committee.

After the appeal stage, the University of Manchester procedures are completed and students are issued with a Completion of Procedures letter, as required by the OIA. During 2015/16 three complaints were submitted to the OIA by students who have been excluded. The OIA has yet to reach a decision on these complaints.

The OIA is appointed as the national independent body to consider student complaints. The OIA has no regulatory powers over universities and cannot punish or fine them; however universities are expected to act upon their recommendations. The Director of Teaching and Learning Support is the University's point of contact for the OIA.

In the settled case, a student's academic appeal had previously been deemed out of time but, by way of settlement to the OIA complaint, the University allowed the student to submit their academic appeal through the full Academic Appeals Procedure as it had transpired that they had been misadvised about the availability of the Academic Appeals Procedure.

The largest proportion of complaint findings by the OIA is that they are Not Justified. Most notably during 2015/16, there has been a substantial decrease in the number of cases being submitted to the OIA. The exact reasons for the


decrease are unclear but it is notable that it coincided with the extension of the OIA complaint timeframe from three to twelve months in 2015 and some students have chosen to take the full twelve months to submit complaints.


