TELLING MIGRATION STORIES WITH DATA - NOVEMBER 7TH, 2017 - FOR YEAR 12 / YEAR 13

This event aims to stimulate interest in the quantitative social sciences among prospective university students so that they gain an appreciation of the value of quantitative methods and encourage them to develop quantitative skills. To do this we aim to encourage students to critically engage with debates about immigration and to have an appreciation of the wide-ranging use of quantitative evidence in the social sciences and public policy debates. The event will also help students develop an understanding about how statistics are used in the news and how to question and evaluate stories which use statistical data. The students will get the opportunity to discuss these debates with experts researching migration at Manchester University and will get hands on experience in analysis of real world data from the most recent Census.

BRITISH IDENTITY WORKSHOP - NOVEMBER 8TH, 2017

The event aims to develop a greater understanding of British Identity using the Museum and Whitworth's collections to give students a greater sense of self and understanding of the diversity of British values. With The University of Manchester's School of Social Sciences

This full day explores contemporary ideas around British Identity, its culture and society, how and why it is has changed over time. Participants will explore global artefacts at Manchester Museum and the Whitworth's South Asian exhibition in relation to the key themes. Students will leave having created their own charter of British Values in comparison with the four values provided through the national curriculum. The event will provide stimulus for discussion, development of critical thinking skills and empathetic reasoning. In a post-Brexit society, what do British Values look like? Utilizing creative approaches, whilst working with an artist, students will create a metaphoric weave to demonstrate this.

This unique event will provide students with an interest in History, Politics, English or Archaeology, an opportunity to act as detectives and use academic sources and historical documents to decide whether or not Anne Boleyn was truly guilt of the adultery and incest crimes she was executed for.

The event will culminate in a debate wherein students will have to persuade a jury of academics if she was guilty in our debating chamber in our law department. Students will be given dozens of online and printed resources to examine and work in groups to make their case as to Anne's innocence or guilt – resources will be prepared by one of our History Lecturers at the University. Through this work they will gain an insight into how historians do the act of researching history and how they will undertake research as history undergraduates.

PRE-UNIVERSITY COURSES FOR SOCIAL SCIENCES

Are your Year 12 or Year 13 students eligible for our social science courses for schools? This scheme is funded by the <u>Office of Fair Access</u> (OFFA). It is designed to promote fair access to higher education and is for state funded schools only. We offer courses in <u>economics</u>, <u>social</u> <u>anthropology</u>, <u>politics</u>, <u>sociology</u> and <u>philosophy</u>.

Eligible students must meet one of the following criteria.

- Live in a neighbourhood which has a low progression rate to higher education or an area which has a high level of deprivation. Use this online tool to check your students' home postcodes.
- Come from a home where neither parent attended university in the UK or abroad.
- Be in receipt of or entitled to discretionary payments/16-19 bursary/Pupil Premium at school/college.
- Be in receipt of or entitled to free school meals.
- Be living in, or have lived in, local authority care.
