# **Head of School Message**

**Dear Colleagues** 

November is a busy time in the academic calendar for many reasons but not least as the heart of the admissions cycle. Open days for potential applicants, visit days for applicants that we want to persuade to come to Manchester, and work supporting recruitment online and through contact with applicants are all



ongoing. Getting admissions right is vital to the sustainability of our programmes and is an excellent example of an area of our work where close teamwork between academic and PSS colleagues is critical. Last year we fell short in recruitment in a few areas, and this year will be challenging, so can I thank all those who are working hard in this area and encourage all colleagues to engage with the admissions process and respond generously to calls for help from the admissions teams.

Decembers graduation is one of the times when we formally mark this and it makes a real difference to our students if their teachers are involved in the ceremony so, if you can, do sign up for one of the four SEED graduation ceremonies.

The explicit addition of distance learning to this role is new and Mark has considerable experience in this area that he will be using to support existing and new initiatives in this area as well as further developing our approaches to e-learning across the school.

#### **Changes to Competition and Markets Authority requirements**

This may be news for some whilst a reminder for others however the Competition and Markets Authority (CMA) requirements are being tightened which requires the University to take a number of actions to remain within the law. One specific action is ensuring that students are presented with the information considered necessary for making a fully informed decision about studying at UOM.

The main impact will be that 31st March is the deadline for confirming all programme changes - this includes withdrawals and suspension of programmes. There are ongoing discussions about what constitutes 'major' or 'minor' changes and further information will become available however if in doubt please ask. The CMA requirements are being discussed with Teaching and Learning Directors and further information will be available from them.

# **Social Responsibility**

On 19<sup>th</sup> October SEED held its annual Social Responsibility Lecture, focusing on 'BME experiences in higher education: inclusion, equity and social justice'. The lecture was led by <u>Professor Kalwant Bhopal</u>, Professor of Education and Social Justice and Professorial Research Fellow in the Centre for Research in Race and Education in the School of Education, University of Birmingham. Kalwant used her research to discuss BME experiences in higher education, as well as institutional racism and the changes we need to move towards a more equal system: '[the] Social justice agenda must be at the heart of our education system'. As part of SEED's commitment to equality and diversity and women into leadership, Kalwant also informally met with female colleagues over tea, where she discussed her career path and trajectory.

The evening also served as a showcase for other SEED funded projects. Manchester Urban Institute displayed their recently launched <u>'Stories from the Road'</u>; a collection of experiences reflecting the impact of a rapidly changing part of the city – Manchester Oxford Road. The area surrounding Manchester Oxford Road is home to a vast number of institutions and organisations, bringing together thousands of people from diverse backgrounds. The Stories from the Road contributors provide a fascinating insight into the varied experiences of people whose lives are affected by this area of Manchester.

Dr Sarah Marie Hall exhibited her research exploring the impact of austerity on everyday family life — <u>The Everyday Austerity Project</u>. The research was carried out between 2013 and 2015, in response to public spending cuts made by the UK government. It involved in-depth ethnographic research with families and communities in Greater Manchester, with a focus on family, friendship and intimate relationships; gender relations, class and inter-generationality; everyday consumption practices and decision-making; and methods for researching 'the everyday' and austere experiences.

<u>The Old Abbey Taphouse</u> received funding from SEED's Big Block of Cheese – a pot of funding for projects that will have a positive impact – and Craig Thomas had a stand at the event to showcase some of these projects. They have built outdoor planters with the funding and children from local schools help them grow herbs and vegetables, which are then used in the kitchen. They have purchased two electric bikes for pizza delivery, to encourage a move toward electric vehicles and bikes. The space is also used for research seminars and presentations (and dinner and drinks afterwards), as well as live music and entertainment, connecting the university with businesses on the Science Park, and the local community.

The Geography Department brought along a pared down version of the exhibit they took to the Bluedot festival over the summer - <u>The Day After Tomorrow - Living in the Anthropocene</u>. Tom Bishop showed visitors some of the tiny fossils used to define the Anthropocene, Abi Stone talked about how they exploit sand as a natural resource, and Gareth Clay demonstrated how peatlands store and release carbon. Jana Wendler and Emma Shuttleworth ran a version of <u>Downpour!</u>, a street game that draws on Emma's research on flood mitigation.

Lecturer in Planning and Environmental Management, Dr Joanne Tippett displayed <u>RoundView</u> at the evening, research that explores an accessible and positive approach to sustainability. Joanne has found that offering guidelines for what a sustainable future might look like, rather than focusing on problems, leads to greater motivation and capacity for action. Working with the Great Manchester Wetlands Partnership, she has used RoundView to interpret the landscape in an innovative way.

To celebrate the ten year anniversary of the University of Manchester's <u>Equity and Merit</u> <u>Scholarship</u>, a scholarship that a number of SEED students have been recipients of, there was also a display providing information about the scholarship and the positive impact it has on students and the communities in their home countries.

With over 100 attendees from across and beyond the university, the evening demonstrated the positive impact SEED has within the university and throughout the local community. With thought-provoking discussion following Kalwant's lecture, and positive feedback and comments from those who attended, the event was a great success. An enormous thank you goes out to everyone who participated in the event and to those who attended.

Liz Birchinall Co-programme director of the primary PGCE was successful in bidding for LEF and SEF funds 2015 to refurbish CG40 as a dual purpose teaching and wellbeing room. As well as refurbishing the room the funds were used to pay for training for three PGCE academics provided by our counselling services in 'passing mindfulness skills' on to trainee teachers. WE also purchased resources such as cushions, blankets and foot blocks to be used in the mindfulness sessions.

This year a programme of wellbeing events are being developed for trainee teachers across the year starting with free mindfulness drop in sessions.

Using country case studies from Africa and Latin America he will pin point the strategic alliances that have enabled developing countries to break out of the poverty trap.





# **Inclusion and Inspiration: Education for Social Justice Conference**

The Manchester Institute of Education runs an annual conference focusing on overcoming inequality in education and social justice. The conference is integrated into the Initial Teacher Education programme for all trainee teachers in MIE and is also open to Newly Qualified Teachers and school-based mentors within the University's partnership of schools.

The conference programme has always been very well-received as it sets out to inspire beginning teachers whilst tackling some of the most challenging issues that they face in their classrooms in order to develop their skills and adopt inclusive practice. The conference offers a wide variety of thought-provoking workshops including understanding autism and dyslexia and tackling mental health issues. Sessions are led by inspirational guest speakers from across the University and school partnership, who come together on the day to share their expertise and experience. Previous keynote speakers have included Professor Neil Humphrey, Director of MIE and Lemn Sissay, MBE.

The fourth annual conference will take place on Wednesday, 17<sup>th</sup> January, 2018 and will include keynote sessions from Dr Sarah MacQuarrie from Manchester Institute of Education on 'Neuromyths in Education' and SF Said, an award-winning author of children's books. It will also include workshops and sessions giving delegates an opportunity to discuss, debate and reflect upon the need for social justice in our education system.
