#### **Abstract:**

This internship will involve research and analysis for the longitudinal studies team, mainly working on reports for the Longitudinal Study of Australian Children (LSAC).

The LSAC Annual Statistical Report provides an overview of data on a range of topics, mainly using descriptive univariate analyses such as frequencies and cross-tabulations to highlight changes as children grow. Chapters are structured around the main themes covered by the LSAC data, including: Family Life; Cognitive Development and Education; Employment and Household Economic Wellbeing; Housing, Neighbourhood and Community; Social and Emotional Functioning; Physical Development and Health.

Data sources: Waves 1 to 7 of the Longitudinal Study of Australian Children.

Much of AIFS' longitudinal data analysis involves the use of one of the six longitudinal studies that it manages. AIFS prepares a range of publications using data from the Longitudinal Study of Australian Children (LSAC) including research reports, Annual Statistical Reports and technical reports.

Currently, the Institute hosts a number of flagship longitudinal studies – Growing Up in Australia (the longitudinal study of Australian children); the Building a New Life in Australia (the longitudinal study of humanitarian migrants; the Australian Temperament Project; and soon will host a national longitudinal study on men's health.
