

Conference 'Music for Liturgy and Devotion in Italy around 1600' Friday 4th and Saturday 5th November 2016, Martin Harris Centre for Music and Drama Conference Report

Programme

Each of the two days of the conference consisted of 2-3 sessions and a keynote lecture. This totals in 11 papers in 5 sessions and 2 keynotes.

Benefits to the Scholarship

The conference offered a platform of exchange for scholars working on Italian liturgical and devotional music in the decades around 1600. It responded to a perceivable lack of opportunity for researchers working in this area to communicate their knowledge. The communication was facilitated by fact that the conference consisted only of plenary sessions. Another beneficial factor was that all academic levels were represented in the conference. The presenters ranged from doctoral researchers to professors and the attendees included Master students and undergraduates.

Whilst being fascinatingly diverse, we felt that the repertoire presented by the papers given, offered a inspiring field of discussion among the musicologists present and led to a better over view of the period and repertoire.

We intended to add an interdisciplinary aspect to the discussions by inviting scholars from other departments within SALC to chair some of the sessions. It was disappointing that we received only one reply that was negative and others failed to respond.

Feedback




