# 4. Information from other areas of the University: PGCert in Higher Education - update

We issued information about the programme in the last TLSO Bulletin but the *closing date has* been extended to June and the programme team would like to see a broader range of applications from all Faculties.

Applications are open for the PgCert in Higher Education programme 2018/19 entry and are welcome from academic staff and PSS colleagues. The programme is free to University of Manchester staff and can play an important role in enhancing your professional development.

Its aim is to help you think more critically about your contribution to the University, as well as to develop a better understanding of the sector-wide changes in the Higher Education landscape. For example, in January 2018, we were delighted to host a Q&A event with The President and Vice-Chancellor. This allowed current and former participants to speak in detail about the issues pertinent to the HE sector covered by the programme. Over 100 of your colleagues have graduated from the PGCert in HE since 2014.

The programme is coordinated through Manchester Institute of Education and delivered by colleagues from around the University.

There is a choice of course units that include topics such as:

- thinking critically about policy (and the ideologies that underpinit) at a time in which the sector moves towards unprecedented levels of institutional competition and comparison.
- looking at open practice, education and access, connecting open practices from across the University. Participants contribute to an open educational resource via an open publication.
- exploring a range of assessment and feedback techniques to suit a Faculty's evolving courses

## 5. Information from the Quality Assurance Agency (QAA)

 UK Standing Committee for Quality Assessment (UKSCQA) publishes new Quality Code Expectations and practices

In April, UKSCQA published the new Expectations and practices for the UK Quality Code for Higher Education. These will be supported by advice and guidance to help providers to interpret and apply the Quality Code. There are a number of consultation workshops being held to develop that advice and guidance. The Expectations and Practices document will form the basis of a fully revised UK Quality Code, which is scheduled for publication in November 2018.

Office for Students now fully operational

The Office for Students, the regulator for higher education in England, is now fully operational. Universities, colleges and other providers of higher education that wish to register with the Office for Students may now do so.

As of 1 April 2018, the QAA is formally the designated quality body in the new regulatory framework and is working with the Office for Students to design and implement the quality and assessment functions set out in the Higher Education and Research Act 2017.
