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• Institutional Surveying 2018/19

As colleagues may know we have recently audited our Institutional Quality Framework which also coincided with the publication of a new UK Quality Code.

The resulting recommendations and impact of these two things will likely lead to a review of how we approach our surveying activity so we will be looking at a longer term, fundamental review of our survey over this next session.

It is intended that this work will be underpinned by the creation of an Institutional Survey Framework to provide the necessary support for our survey activity including deployment, training, promotion, outputs and analysis. As you can imagine, this is a big piece of work which we are planning to undertake in the context of a review of all our quality monitoring systems and the Teaching and Learning Group are currently discussing how we can take this forward. Whatever the outcome we will obviously be taking a consultative approach that will take account your feedback.

This means that for 2018/19 the following arrangements for surveying are in place:

 Course Unit Evaluation Surveys (UEQs) will continue to be deployed during 2018/2019 replicating the same arrangements as last session with UEQs already deployed in 2017/18 continuing to be delivered by Schools. Colleagues have already been notified of arrangements for Semester 1 UEQs which will be deployed between 03 December 2018 and 04 January 2019. - As expected we will be participating in the National Student Survey (NSS) and the Postgraduate Research Experience Survey (PRES) during this session. Arrangements for both of these external surveys are currently being finalised and communications will be sent out shortly to confirm deployment dates and communication plans.
- In order to engage more effectively with the Postgraduate Taught Experience
 Survey (PTES), and to encourage increased response-rates we will now
 participate in PTES in alternate sessions starting in 2019/20. We will therefore NOT
 be participating in PTES during this session. In line with the wider plans referred to
 above we will utilise this 'gap' year to consult with colleagues and students to
 consider how this decision can be operationalised, including how it will impact
 upon our internal PGT Dissertation survey.

• New CUIP Discoverer Reports

In a recent audit by UNIAC of Course Unit Information Publishing (CUIP) data, recommendations have been made to address a number of data quality issues. So that these issues can be addressed and we remain compliant with our obligations to the Competition and Markets Authority, some new worksheets/reports have been introduced within the Discoverer CUIP suite of reports – SDM_STU_CUIP_REPORTS. Peer Support

9th Annual SI-PASS/PAL Conference

On the 2nd-4th November 2018, Peer Support in collaboration with the University of Manchester's Student's Union (UMSU) and the European Centre for SI-PASS hosted the 9th Annual European SI-PASS/PAL Conference, which welcomed 140 staff and student delegates from across 36 institutions to Manchester. The PASS model at Manchester sees 900 trained PASS Leaders, from 31 PASS Schemes, facilitating lower year students in weekly timetabled academic study sessions. This model is in place in institutions across Europe and the Annual European SI-PASS/PAL Conference creates a chance for staff and student delegates from different institutions to come together, create and learn from each other. This year as well as hosting, The University of Manchester was extremely well represented by 8 exceptional PASS Leaders, from across all three faculties.

Peer Support (continued...)

The conference theme of 'Empowering Leaders of the Future: Who Will We Bee?' used the worker bee symbol of tenacity, resilience and community to shape a programme that incorporated local Manchester culture mixed with concrete SI-PASS/PAL concepts to empower delegates and the students they support. The student delegates were separated into teams of 10 from mixed institutions and set a series of team challenges, designed to for them to answer the question 'what will Peer Learning look like in the year X at University Y.'



Key note speakers delivered presentations that enabled delegates to take away thoughts and questions that fed into their later presentations. Matt Atkin, Director of Planning, delivered an inspiring key note speech highlighting upcoming change in Higher Education, incorporating the key themes of 'No Barriers to Studying' and 'No Boundaries to Learning' found within 'Our Vision'. Paul Redmond, Director of Student Experience and Enhancement at The

University of Liverpool, gave a key note titled 'Generations of the Future: who will they bee?' showcasing the growing number of generations in the workplace and how we can best understand and communicate with one another.

The conference was exciting, enjoyable and inspiring. One of our Manchester student delegates, Gibran Andrade who is an Electrical and Electronic Engineering PASS Leader, commented that 'After the conference, I was inspired to improve not only as a person but also as a PASS leader since I had an opportunity to hear about different experiences of SI-PASS/PAL all over the UK and Europe'.
