

## Multimedia Glossary

- **AIFF:** Audio interchange file format - an uncompressed audio file format developed by Apple.
- **Blog:** A regularly updated website or webpage, typically run by an individual or group.
- **Browser:** The program a website visitor is using to view a website. Google Chrome, Firefox
- **CSS or Cascading Style Sheets:** language used to change the look and functionality of websites.
- **Codec:** A program that encodes or decodes digital information. They are used to create or read audio and video files.
- **Compression:** A method of reducing file sizes, particularly in digital media such as photos, audio and video.
- **Content:** the information presented within a website or blog.
- **CMS or Content Management System:** backend tool for managing a site's content that separates said content from the design and functionality of the site
- **Domain:** The domain is the name by which a website is identified. The domain is associated with an IP address
- **HD:** High definition.
- **HTML:** Stands for Hypertext Mark-up Language. It's the primary language used to write web pages.
- **Hyperlink:** A hyperlink is a link from one web page to another, either on the same site or another one.
- **MP3:** A standard audio file format which uses lossy compression. Compatible with most media players. Designed by the Moving picture experts group - layer 3.
- **Open source:** A model for creating technology that promotes free access to its design and makes it free to share.
- **Pixel:** the basic unit of programmable colour on a computer display or in a computer image.
- **Plugin:** A plug-in is a bit of third party code that extends the capabilities of a website. It's most often used in conjunction with a CMS or blogging platform.
- **Post:** A single unit of content on a blog, made up of a title and text.
- **Raster:** Image made of pixels so it can be styled more but loses quality when made bigger  
Example: photo
- **Resolution:** The physical number of pixels displayed on a screen.
- **SD:** Standard definition.
- **Sidebar:** One or more columns generally found on the side of most blogs and contain plugins.
- **Social Media:** websites and applications that enable users to create and share content or to participate in social networking.
- **Streaming:** Data that is sent in pieces. Each piece is viewed as it arrives, eg a streaming video is watched as it downloads.
- **Template:** A template is a file used to create a consistent design across a website. Templates are often used in conjunction with a CMS.
- **Uncompressed:** A file which has not had any data removed through compression.
- **URL:** Stands for Uniform Resource Locator. A site's URL is its address, the item that specifies where on the Internet it can be found.
- **Vector Image:** Instead of using pixels to represent images, vectors use lines and shapes. Because they do not rely on pixels, enlarged vector images still maintain image clarity and quality.
- **WAV:** An uncompressed audio file format developed by Microsoft.
- **Web Server:** A web server is a computer that has software installed and networking capabilities that allow it to host web sites and pages and make them available to internet users located elsewhere.
