From our beginnings as England's first civic university we've sought to break down boundaries and improve lives. We opened up education to the working classes and removed religious tests for entry in the 19th century.

Christabel Pankhurst studied here before campaigning for the suffragettes. We employed Sir William Arthur Lewis, economics pioneer and the UK's first black professor. And our first female academic, Marie Stopes, advocated birth control for women.

Now our research is tackling some of the world's biggest challenges including health care, sustainability and social inequalities. Through our unique Stellify initiative, our students are contributing to key ethical issues and supported to become the responsible leaders of tomorrow.

Our social and environmental impact is ranked best in Europe and third in the world by *Times Higher Education*, with our commitment to the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) showcased in our local, national and global work.

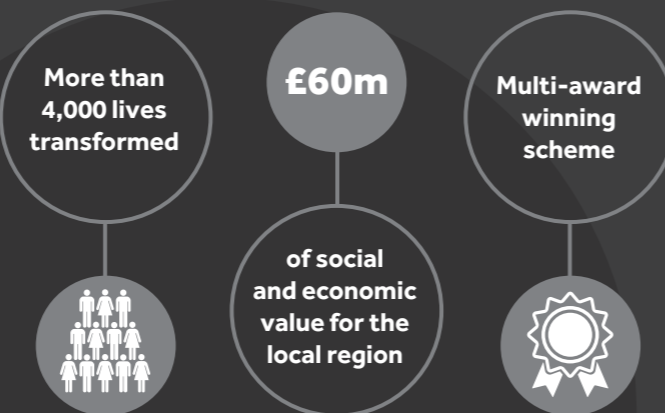
THE WORKS



Like many cities, Manchester has a high proportion of people who face barriers in finding employment.

The Works is a unique unemployment initiative set up by our University in 2011 to help people back into work.

Established in partnership with local not-for-profit agency The Growth Company, The Works offers a one-stop employment service providing support to local unemployed people, as well as delivering pre-recruitment training and job matches to local businesses – including the University, one of the city's largest employers.



The University not only gave me training with a job at the end, it's actually going to change my life.

John Jackson had been unemployed for more than a year and living in the Manchester homeless community. The Works helped him find work as a building attendant at the University.

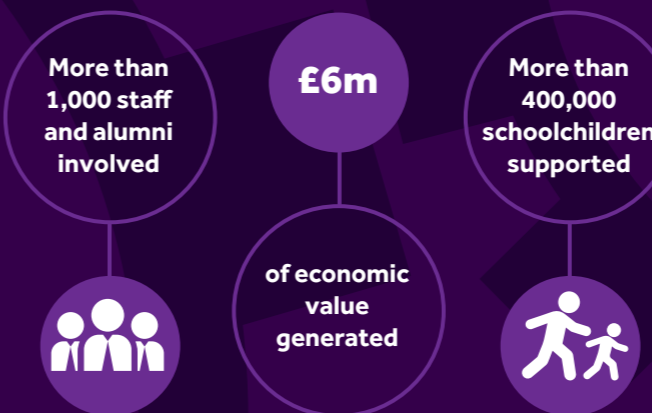
SCHOOL GOVERNOR INITIATIVE



All young people should have the chance to realise their full potential.

Our School Governor Initiative is levelling the playing field by encouraging our community of staff and alumni to join governing bodies to help raise standards.

We have supported more state schools with new governors than any other UK university. This initiative helps raise education standards, creates stronger links with local communities and opens up a range of higher education opportunities to schoolchildren.



University governors have an academic perspective that is slightly different from ours; that perspective of knowing education, but not being in our particular part of it, helps to keep our minds more open.

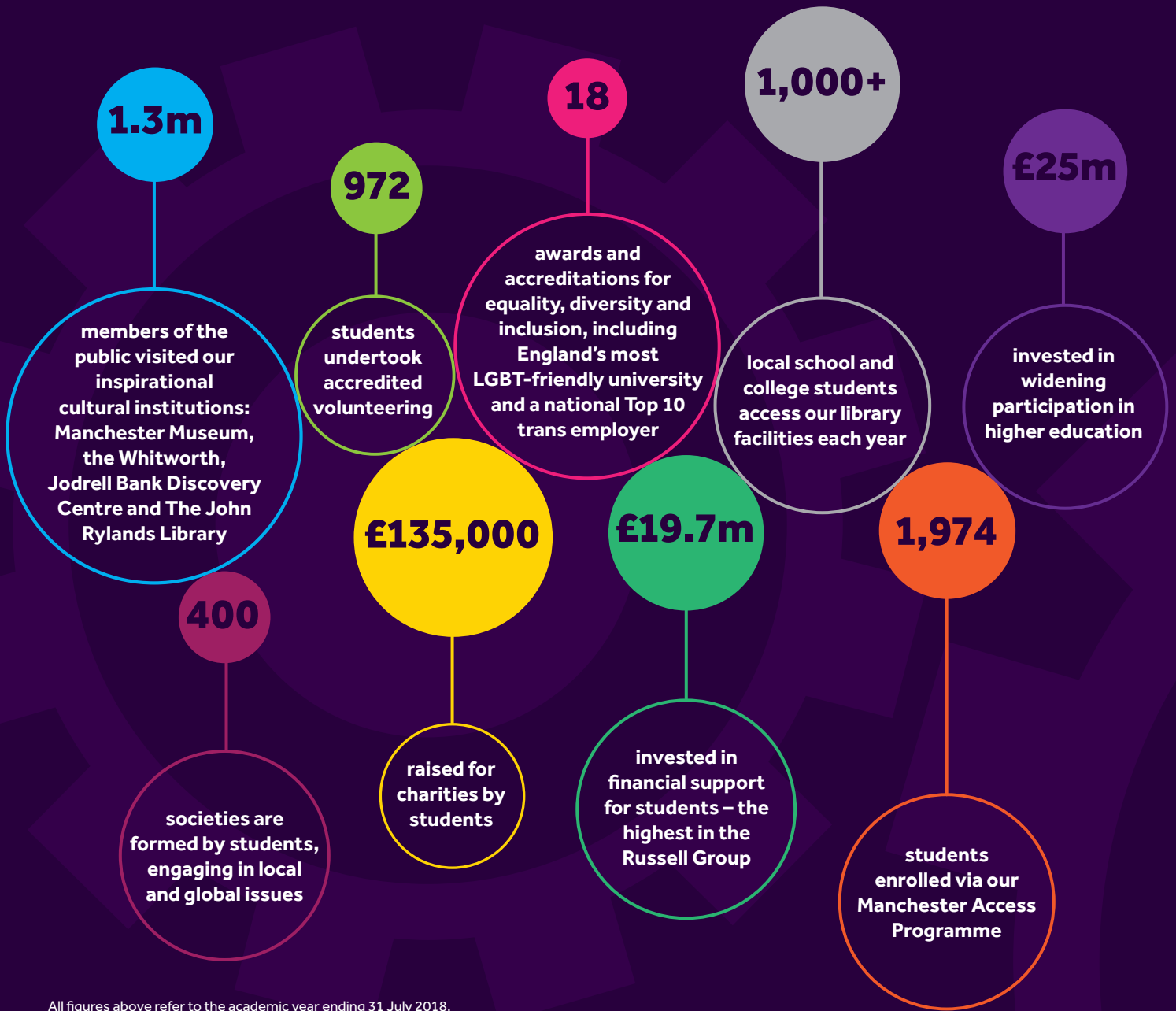
