YOUR GUIDE TO POSTGRADUATE TAUGHT STUDY

Shaped by our esteemed research environment, Manchester's postgraduate taught courses help you gain specialist knowledge, develop new skills and further your career with an advanced qualification.

Discover the varied learning options open to you, as well as potential funding sources and tips on applying for courses at Manchester.

TYPES OF TAUGHT RESEARCH PROGRAMMES

Master's courses

- Usually 12 months full-time / 24 months part-time:* more intensive, efficient and cost-effective than the two-year, full-time options offered in most other countries.
- Usually begin in September, the start of our academic year.
- Usually two semesters of lectures, seminars and assessed work, then four or five months' research, culminating in an independent dissertation or project. (The balance of taught and research elements, and methods of assessment, vary from course to course.)

- Options include: Master of Arts (MA), Master of Business Administration (MBA),* Master of Education (MEd), Master of Science (MSc), Master of Law (LLM) and Master of Music (MusM).
- Our Master of Research (MRes) is slightly different, preparing you for doctoral research by including extensive research training and subject-specific advanced learning.

Postgraduate diplomas (PGDip) and certificates (PGCert)

- Expand on your bachelor's degree and complement your professional experience with fresh insights, without submitting a dissertation.
- Usually six months for PGCert / nine months for PGDip.
- Many part-time options make the courses easier to fit in alongside your career.

*Our MBA lasts 18 months full-time and up to five years part-time.

Most of our taught courses don't have official closing dates for applications; we simply advise you to apply as soon as possible. However, there are exceptions. If a particular master's course has a closing date for applications, we'll state this on the individual course pages on our website.

Research funding options

If you intend to apply for funding or the postgraduate loan (for UK/EU students), make sure you know the application closing dates for the relevant funding bodies. Most of them expect you to have a provisional offer from the University before you apply for their studentships, scholarships and awards, so apply to us as early as possible.

Join us

If your application is accepted, we'll warmly welcome you into our community at Manchester. Our postgraduate taught courses usually begin at the start of our academic year in September.
