Selection Method

Written CV & cover letter followed by an interview with a presentation with ILC UK team via Skype. Please note that ILC UK set a written test to be completed during the hour before the interview. Candidates would receive the instructions for the test at the start of the hour.

Project Outline

The ILC are seeking to publish a report exploring the formal and informal economic contributions of older adults across a number of countries globally. This piece aims to challenge the narrative that an ageing population is only a burden to the economy and focus policy makers' on the opportunities that are created by demographic change. The report will highlight the significant economic contributions of older adults, how these are growing, and the opportunity for these to increase if societal barriers to economic participation are overcome, particularly related to health, and in so doing, help to pay for rising fiscal costs.

Project Outline

This research will use data from Eurostat, the OCED, among other sources, to estimate the prevalence of the following economic activities at older ages across a number of countries and over a number of years:

- Employment
- Earned income
- Consumption
- Volunteering and/or caring

This research will also consider why these economic contributions are greater in certain contributions are greater in certain countries relative to others, by exploring relevant country specific policies and interventions (such as interventions to tackle age discrimination, support older workers, and support people to age healthily). We will also consider whether measures of health (at older ages) and investment in health are related to some of these economic contributions – where the data is available, to assess the importance of good health in maximising these contributions.

The report will be launched in Washington – with the aim of showcasing the key findings to policy makers from a number of countries. We are able to offer a motivated intern the opportunity to support this research – particularly with the later stages.
