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Project One: Clean Air For All

The Times Clean Air for All Campaign shined a light on Britain's air pollution crisis, exposing the consequences of poor air quality and putting relenting pressure on the government to improve the air we breathe and refresh Britain's out-dated Clean Air Act.

We are continuing the campaign by exploring how Britain can use both technology and policy to tackle air pollution and plan to stress test solutions recommended by air quality scientists. This will involve looking at the data behind pilot schemes and projections and applying the findings to the rest of the country. The project will pose a statistical challenge and will require the accurate and responsible reporting of modelling data. We hope it will be a constructive piece with plenty of opportunity to find strong new lines.

Project Two: Understanding Britain's Private Schools

We are looking into the financial reserves of private schools and whether they are hoarding wealth and assets despite paying no tax. Private schools are mostly charitable entities that do not pay tax because they are deemed to serve a matter of public benefit by providing education.

But given the high fees charged and limited financial support provided to poorer students – and a tendency to better the already well off – this charitable status is controversial. If it were found that many of these schools were hoarding assets rather than using their funds to cut fees for worse off students, this would be particularly interesting.

Many Times readers who are moderate earns and would like the chance to send their kids to private school would find it shocking that this hoarding could prevent them from offering their children a better education. This idea came off the back of a similar debate around the use by military charities of their reserves.

We would be looking to analyse the public data on private school reserves and to collate information from charity accounts to analyse this hypothesis.
