Over the summer you are advised to do some Geography subject knowledge development and revision so please spend some time looking at GCSE and A 'level revision guides and course books. - Magazines and comics

- Tickets and receipts of tourist attractions to build up a case study of places you've visited.

For the first Geography session on induction day (Monday, 10th September) you will need a geography artefact from a recent holiday or adventure to present to the group. It will be used in an ice-breaking activity and you can take it home with you again afterwards.
