• National Teaching Fellowship awards news

Three University of Manchester academics have been recognised for their “outstanding” work at this year’s Advance HE Teaching Excellence Awards for Higher Education.

Professor Jackie Carter and Drs Senathirajah Ariyaratnam and Bhuvanewari Krishnamoorthy have all been named National Teaching Fellows (NTF). The NTF scheme celebrates and recognises individuals who have made an exceptional impact on student outcomes and the teaching profession in higher education.

This year is the 20th anniversary of the scheme and just 56 fellows from Universities nationwide have been named. Each institution is limited to just three nominations with all of Manchester’s contenders winning the award this year making it a full house. It is the first time this has ever happened for the University.

One of the current projects is looking at student-staff partnership. This survey aims to capture the experience of staff engaging in current or recent student-staff partnership practice at The University of Manchester. Your views and reflections on the impact of partnerships will help inform future support and development for partnership practice across the University. The survey should take approximately 10 minutes to complete.

A useful definition of student-staff partnership practice is:

"a way of thinking and practicing in higher education that re-positions students and staff as active collaborators in the diverse processes of teaching and learning – empowering students to be actively engaged in, and share the responsibility for, their own education"

2. Peer Support/Student Engagement

- **Stellify and Step Up and Lead**

The Stellify Award is an honour uniquely offered to graduates of the University of Manchester. In order to receive the award on graduating, the student must complete a variety of different tasks and responsibilities throughout their studies, proving that they are a graduate with a transferable skillset alongside their degree. Students are required to complete 3 Ethical Grand Challenges, undertake 40 hours of volunteering within the community, and take on at least 2 Step Up and Lead roles.

This Academic year, 350 students graduated from the University of Manchester with the Stellify award, a huge leap forward from the previous year's 112. Within Peer Support, we offer lots of opportunities to undertake Step Up and Lead Roles. Alongside the typical roles of PASS Leader, Peer Mentors, students can also get involved as a Student Coordinator for their scheme. We also offer Basic Life Support training, where students can learn basic skills to help save lives and then run training sessions for others! This year, 1,312 students undertook two or more Step Up and Lead roles, whilst 3,753 were in at least one!

It's a huge success for the Stellify scheme, and the Peer Support team is incredibly proud of all the students that got involved!
