# Queering Manchester Museum LGBTQ+ Programme for Manchester Pride

Manchester Museum, part of The University of Manchester, celebrates Manchester Pride in spectacular style, with a programme of online, digital and download activities and events throughout August and beyond. This includes a fabulous, family friendly digital drag show, Queer Tales: Myths and Monsters which premieres on Manchester Museum's YouTube channel at 6pm on Thursday 27 August and a Panel Discussion on Thursday 3 September in response to the performance, themed around belonging and LGBTQ+ inclusion in museums.

Co-curated with Cheddar Gorgeous, one of Manchester's most celebrated drag queens, **Queer Tales: Myths and Monsters** explores both ancient and modern mythologies through a queer eye. The reworking of mythologies from marginalised perspectives is not only a reminder that LGBTQ+ people have always existed, it is also a powerful way to challenge patriarchal narratives and to celebrate the queer experience. The show will include performances by a diverse cast of drag artists who have each used objects from Manchester Museum's collection as the starting point for an artistic response, showcasing queer storytelling at its most creative.

The panel discussion, **Queer Tales: A Conversation**, will bring responses to the performance from diverse perspectives within a conversation themed around **belonging**. We will be exploring how museums can create safe spaces to tell and listen to the stories and histories of the LGBTQ+ community.

The museum has also launched a programme of digital activities and resources on our mobile site Manchester Museum in Quarantine <u>www.mminquarantine.com</u>. This includes **download activities** for families and a **digital trail** which brings LGBTQ+ voices to some of the museum's most iconic objects as well as some hidden gems. There are also **links and resources** from organisations doing great work with LGBTQ+ people and their families. We will continue adding to these activities and resources.

The **Queering Manchester Museum** project celebrates and builds on work we have done in recent years, including 'An Afternoon with the Family Gorgeous' which was recognised for its positive social impact, shortlisted as a finalist for Best Event at the 2019 Manchester Culture Awards. This is an ongoing project.

Esme Ward, Director of Manchester Museum said:

'Museums should be safe and welcoming spaces where diversity of identity is celebrated. This programme aims to reveal untold stories and amplify the voices of the LGBTQ+ community; this reflects the museum's ambition to become the most inclusive, imaginative and caring museum you might imagine.'
