



Position at 30 May: cumulative applicants




Extra

- Preferable to clearing




The changing profile of accepted applicants

Accepted applicants (17-19 year olds, UK domiciled)






Applicants & Accepts 2003 – 2010 (provisional)






Applicants and Accepts Manchester University: 2000-2010







Institution Grouping – Total Accepts: 2010 (prov.)



Educational Establishment – UK Dom. Accepts aged 17-19: 2010 (prov.)




Educational establishments of accepted applicants UK 17-19: 2010






Distance travelled by UK accepted applicants: 2010








The changing profile of accepted applicants





Use of the UCAS Tariff for offer making

- Offer making in 2010:
- 45.4% qualifications only
- 13.5% qualifications + Tariff points
- 41.1% Tariff points only



- Offer making at selective institutions (Russell Group):
- 98.8%% qualifications only
- 0.6% qualifications + Tariff points
- 0.6% Tariff points only



Myth: Universities change the goalposts

- Minimum entry requirements
 - Are minimum entry requirements
- Achieving minimum entry requirements gets you on the pile that gets considered
 - Then additional sifts are applied
 - Everyone competing for the place your candidates
 want will also meet the minimum requirements
- Good advisors will understand the likely sifting process at target institutions



Myth: Three A Grades doesn't secure a place any more......

- 3000+ with three A grades 'missed out'
 - There are plenty of institutions who will accept applicants with three grade As
- Only 63% of those predicted Grade A actually achieve it
 - HEIs use other evidence from the application to test the validity of your predictions

- Broaden your choice of institution
- Broaden your choice of course






- > Strategies.....
 - Insurance choice
 - It's a backstop not a second option
 - In a competitive market, use it as a backstop
 - 42% had CIs harder or equal to CFs
 - Post qualifications admission





Tuition Fees – another view......

- Nobody pays 'tuition fees'......
-but you do incur a liability for paying additional income tax if you earn more than £21K
- Like income tax, you can drop in and out of the higher graduate tax band
- The amount you pay back monthly is the same if you choose a £9K course or a £6K course (but you might pay for longer)
- Repayments are pegged to income not the size of the loan
- For lower income brackets, the new regime is more 'affordable' than the current arrangements UC/\S

New for 2012: Contextual data service

- UK-wide data set provided at request of HEIs:
- school performance
- % free school meals & EMA
- % students from low progression neighbourhoods
- No requirement to use contextual data
- HEIs will have to opt-in to UCAS service & explain how they will use the information



Admissions Process Review

- Choices
- Balance between
 - Parallel (currently five choices)
 - Sequential (currently 'Extra')
 - PQA (currently clearing)
- Offers including insurance
- Better processes
 - Reduce errors and missing information
 - Pre-screen applications
 - Match results to offers
- Improvements for personal statements and references
- Customised application processes
