Summary

- Considerable time and effort is put into making international students feel as welcomed and informed as possible. An excellent orientation programme is provided by the university.
- There are pockets of excellent practice across the Faculty addressing issues such as plagiarism and student mentoring. Good practice could be more widely promoted across the Faculty.
- Postgraduate students who arrive at times different to undergraduates are at risk of 'slipping through the net' in terms of their induction.
- Students on 1-year Masters programmes are a particularly vulnerable cohort. They have little time to 'catch-up' when things go wrong, they may not know any students from previous years (who could give informal support), and their international experience may be more mono-cultural than for students on longer programmes.
- To improve the support of international students we can make the biggest improvement by 'joining the dots' between existing services and pockets of good practice.
- We could be more consistent across the Faculty in using alumni as role-models for students on 1-year programmes.
