SPREAD THE WORD

Staff across the University are being asked to help promote the 'Tell Us' campaign, which is designed to maximise the response rate by students to the Student Barometer Survey and also Unit Surveys.

The first phase of the **Student Barometer Survey**, in October and November 2011, yielded a wealth of information about student life at Manchester, informing the University's ambition to provide an outstanding experience.

Now the University and Students' Union have teamed up again to check whether student expectations are being met, and whether previously identified good support and service is being maintained. All Manchester students are being asked to 'Tell Us' - by taking the Student Barometer Survey via My Manchester (<http://my.manchester.ac.uk>) by 17 May.

There is a £500 prize for the School with the best response rate and £500 for the School with the most improved response rate, to be spent on enhancing the student experience.

Unit Surveys (formerly known as Unit Evaluation Questionnaires) are part of the University's commitment in 'Towards Manchester 2015' to listen to students and to seek annual improvements in the quality of the teaching and learning they experience.



The online Unit Surveys will be available in Blackboard from 30 April to 11 May. Several Schools have chosen to use a paper-based questionnaire in place of the online version.

PRESIDENT'S UPDATE

Each month in Staff Update we publish a summary of the President's weekly message, for staff who don't have access to email or the internet at work.

22 March 2012

The annual two-day conference for the University's Board of Governors took place at Chancellors, attended by all members of the Board and the Planning and Resources Committee. It discussed progress and achievements against the University's plans and goals; updated the Board on all key aspects of the University; discussed future goals - notably Manchester 2020; and considered future challenges and major decisions to be taken.

29 March 2012

A meeting of senior staff from across the University discussed the draft Strategic Plan 2020, which addresses how the University will achieve the targets and ambitions of the Manchester 2020 Vision, published in November 2011. At present, it identifies a small



number of high-level KPIs and targets against which performance will be measured across the University. The President invited staff to comment on the draft Strategic Plan through their Head of School or Directorate.

The President attended a civic lunch at the Town Hall to commemorate the Queen's visit to Manchester.

6 April 2012

The President reported that the standard minimum fee for UK/EU PGT students in 2012/13 would be £5,000, which is well below the cost of delivering full-time masters programmes. The University was considering how it could assist students and would investigate a loyalty discount for its own graduates.

RYMAN IN RUNNING FOR PRIZES

Geoff Ryman, Senior Lecturer in the Centre for New Writing, is in line to win both of science fiction's most coveted accolades after being placed on the final ballots for both the Hugo and Nebula awards for his novelette 'What We Found'.

He hopes to join the list of previous Hugo novelette winners, who include Brian Aldiss, Richard Cowper and Ursula Le Guin, when the result is announced in front of 20,000 science fiction fans at the world SF convention in August.

The work has also made the final ballot for the American Nebula Awards. Previous winners include Brian Aldiss and Arthur C Clarke.

First published in The Magazine of Science Fiction in 2011, the novelette is about a scientific breakthrough by a Nigerian scientist, and the deep personal impact it has on how he understands his own family history from independence to the future in 2030.

Geoff said: "I'm delighted and proud that 'What We Found' has been nominated for both the Hugo Award and Nebula in the Best Novelette categories. It's made especially fine for me in that one of my fellow nominees for the Hugo is an ex-student of mine, Ferrett Steinmetz."

AWARDS SUCCESS

The University and the Faculty of Life Sciences have succeeded in renewing their Athena SWAN awards, which recognise employment practices that support female researcher careers.

The University has renewed its Bronze award and the Faculty of Life Sciences its Silver department award.

The awards were presented at a reception at the University of Birmingham on 3 May.

OBITUARY: DR PETER LOWE

8 April 1941 - 24 February 2012

Born and educated in Cardiff, Dr Peter Lowe joined the history department of the Victoria University of Manchester in 1965 and spent his entire academic career here.

He was a distinguished international historian of the 20th century Asia-Pacific, and the author of six major books.

Peter was also the secretary of the British Association for Japan Studies for some years, and was elected president in 1985.

Peter was a caring and diligent teacher on a broad range of subjects, supervising a large number of graduate students and supporting colleagues through the staff association.

He retired in 2004 as Reader in History in the School of Arts, Histories and Cultures and was appointed Honorary Senior Research Fellow.

In retirement, Peter moved to Poole, where he was able to indulge his passion for walking on the south coast and his deep interest in opera and ballet.

Peter was industrious, generous, sociable, and a born conversationalist. His friends had expected him to enjoy years of fruitful retirement, but he died after a short illness.

LIFE SAVING EQUIPMENT ON CAMPUS

Cardiac arrest has been in the headlines recently with the dramatic on-pitch collapse of Bolton Wanderers footballer Fabrice Muamba.

Fabrice's experience just goes to highlight that many of us would be unaware of what to do in a similar situation.

The University has invested in a number of Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) which are available at various points across the campus.

An AED is a simple piece of equipment which **anyone** can use to increase the survival chances of someone in cardiac arrest.

NEW MANAGEMENT FOR DRYDEN STREET NURSERY

The Bertram Nursery Group has been chosen to manage the University's nursery at Dryden Street from 1 August 2012.

The nursery will continue to offer the same number of places to the children of University staff and students.

Current staffing levels will remain the same and fees will be frozen until August 2013.

The University will continue to subsidise the current number of places for children of students and there are no plans to reduce this commitment. The nursery will remain a designated Workplace Nursery for University staff.

The company also runs nurseries at MediaCity UK, Hope Hospital and the Greater Manchester Police.

EQUALITY DATA IN MYVIEW

Monday 21 May is World Diversity Day and to celebrate this, staff are being asked to update their equality information online via MyView.

You can use MyView to include information about your race, religion or belief, sexual orientation and any disability you may have.

This information helps us to produce anonymous statistical reports.

If you haven't used MyView before, you'll need to create a memorable phrase - which is different from your usual username and password - to keep your personal information safe and secure.

CLAIM STAFF EXPENSES ONLINE

Claiming expenses for a University business trip is now easier and faster. A single new web form for expenses claims, accessed via the staff portal, has replaced the paper forms PR1a, PR1b and PR2.

You can input your expenses while still away on your business trip and the online system will keep a record of your claim.

Online guidance and live validation of your finance code will speed up the processing of claims. The Payroll Team will aim to pay your claim within two weeks of receiving your completed and authorised form. You'll be able to keep track of your expenses payments on MyView.

If you have already received information about local arrangements for phasing out the old forms, please abide by this.
