<p>Target audience</p> <p>This course is suited for those interested in multidisciplinary study of humanitarian responses to crises originating from both conflict zones and natural disasters.</p>	<p>Target audience</p> <p>This course is suited for those interested in learning the connection between academic studies of natural and man-made disaster to practical disaster management activities such as disaster risk reduction, business continuity and risk assessment.</p>	<p>Target audience</p> <p>This course is suited for those interested in understanding the causes of conflict and the range of policies that seek to resolve these conflicts in the short term and build just, sustainable peace in the long term.</p>	<p>Target audience</p> <p>Developed by academics with extensive field experience working together with experienced practitioners, this course is tailored to NGO workers and volunteers (both in the field and office based), development workers, human rights workers, clinicians, and healthcare practitioners and administrators around the world.</p>
<p>Course details</p> <p>The course brings together scholars from medicine and the humanities to offer a multidisciplinary perspective to the study of Humanitarianism and Conflict Response. Students will be able to draw upon an exceptionally wide range of disciplinary traditions and research expertise, embracing history, the arts, medicine, politics and development studies. Throughout the year students will have the opportunity to engage with scholars and practitioners from the humanitarian world, including Dr Rony Brauman and Prof Tony Redmond.</p>	<p>Course details</p> <p>The course is designed for participants who want to develop both theoretical and practical management skills in preparation, response and recovery from natural and man-made disasters. The core curriculum combines the development of practical analysis skills to support emergency management policies with an understanding of ethical issues in global humanitarian actions. This results in a course that is suitable as a way to develop initial skills in disaster management or support continuing education for disaster management professionals.</p>	<p>Course details</p> <p>This course offers students an interdisciplinary perspective with insights from law, politics, philosophy, development studies, peace studies, anthropology and global health providing students with a holistic understanding of the causes of and solutions to conflict. Throughout the year, students will have the opportunity to engage with some of the world's leading peace scholars and peacebuilding practitioners.</p>	<p>Course details</p> <p>The course covers issues related to the worldwide improvement of health, the reduction of disparities, and protection against global threats that disregard national borders. It is unique in bringing together the study of emergency medicine, disaster management, community health, anthropology and sociology of health and illness in an online format. As such it offers both a practical means of study and an inclusive approach which mirrors the reality of health interventions within a humanitarian context. Students will have the opportunity to learn from leading scholars/practitioners including Dr Rony Brauman and Prof Tony Redmond.</p>
