PLEASE NOTE:

When selecting your course units you must ensure you take:

- 120 credits overall (including any compulsory courses)
- Minimum of 50 credits per semester
- Maximum of 70 credits per semester
- Minimum 100 credits must be Level 3
- Maximum 20 credits at Level 2 (students at Level 3 are not normally permitted to take Level 1 credits)
- Joint honours students may take up to a maximum of 20 credits (free choice) outside of the two named subject areas, subject to approval by the relevant Programme Director

HELPFUL HINT:

- ✓ The semester a course is taught in is identified by the last digit in the course code. E.G CLAH30220. A '0' identifies the course unit is taught over both semesters, a '1' indicates Semester 1 and '2' indicates Semester 2
