### Regulations:

- All Level 2 MHE students will automatically be registered for HIST20392 Independent Research Project (20 credits)
- All Level 2 MHE students must choose 100 additional credits of optional course units (Lists A – E)

After following Steps 1 to 5 below, all Level 2 MHE students must have:

- Total selection of exactly 120 credits
- Maximum of 80 credits of HIST-, HSTM-, MEST-, RELT-, RUSS- and SALC-coded course units (including HIST 20390). You cannot select HIST-coded credits from List E so could not select more than 60 HIST-coded credits, including HIST20392.
- Minimum of 20 credits and maximum of 40 credits of ECON-coded course units. You cannot select ECON-coded credits from List E.
- Minimum of 50 credits of course units in each semester
- Maximum of 70 credits of course units in each semester
- Course units whose lectures do not clash – check the timetable

The semester in which a course unit is taught is identified by the last digit in the course code (e.g. HIST1010**1** = Semester 1).

A **0** (zero) final digit indicates the course unit is taught across both semesters.

### Note on Credit Allocation Across Semesters and HIST Independent Research Project:

- When calculating your credit allocation by semester, the credits for **0-** (zero) coded courses should usually be divided equally between Semester 1 and Semester 2

### Note on School of Social Sciences Course Selection and ECON-coded Course Units:

- MHE students must complete the School of Social Sciences (SoSS) and AMBS (BMAN) Course Selection Process to register for all SoSS and AMBS course units, including ECON- and POLI-coded course units.
- **There are some AMBS accounting and finance assessments that may have to be completed on campus should you wish to qualify for professional accreditation/exemptions. These assessments may only be available when on campus assessments are possible and you may choose to wait until such time to**

undertake these. Please note that if you opt to do this it may have an impact on the duration of your degree. If this will affect a course you are taking AMBS will be in touch with you closer to the assessment period.

**Note on ECON Course Unit Pre-requisites:**

- Many of the Level 2 ECON courses in Lists C and D have ECON co/pre-requisites, most of which are listed below. Students can only register for Level 2 ECON course units if they have the necessary Level 1 ECON pre-requisites
- It is the responsibility of students to check any co/pre-requisite information for their desired ECON courses. This information can be searched for on the My Learning tab in My Manchester.

**Note on Students Studying Abroad in Semester 2:**

Students who have been offered a place to study abroad in Semester 2 must:

- Choose 60 credits of Semester 1 only courses (**no -0 (zero) or -2 coded units**) of which twenty credits must come from ECON coded modules only (under list C/1 in the level 2 MHE regulations)
- Also nominate 40 credits of **Semester 2** only courses (**no -0 (zero) or -1 coded units**) and HIST 20392 Independent Research Project
- All MHE Study Abroad Students must discuss their options with the MHE Programme Liaison Officer prior to module selection.
- If students are successful in securing their place abroad, then they will not be required to undertake the Independent Research Project or their nominated 40 credits of Semester 2 courses

Please note that swapping or dropping full-year optional modules is prohibited after week 2 of semester 1.
