Regulations:

- All Level 3 MHE students must take HIST30970
- All Level 3 MHE students must choose 80 additional credits of optional course units (Lists B-E)

After following Steps 1 to 5 below, all Level 3 MHE students must have:

- Total selection of exactly 120 credits
- **Students may take no more than 70 credits in any one semester** (including 20 credits per semester for the 40-credit dissertation).
- Course units which do not clash – **check the timetable**
- Select no more than 20 credits of University Language Centre modules

Note on Allocation of Credits Across Semesters and HIST30970:

- **Students may take no more than 70 credits in any one semester** (including 20 credits per semester for the 40-credit dissertation). Students would be advised not to exceed 60 credits (including 20 for the dissertation) in semester 2.
- Students must plan their dissertation research schedule appropriately, and in consultation from welcome week onwards with their appointed dissertation supervisor.
- The semester in which a course is taught is identified by the last digit in the code (eg HIST30101 = Sem. 1). A 0 (zero) final digit, e.g. HIST30970, indicates that the course is taught across both semesters and the total credit weighting for the unit is to be divided equally between semesters.

Note on ECON Course Unit Pre-requisites:

- Some of the ECON courses in List E have Level 2 ECON pre-requisites, most of which are listed below. Students can only register for L3 ECON course units if they have the necessary Level 2 ECON pre-requisites.
- It is the responsibility of students to check any co or pre-requisite information for their desired ECON options. This information can be found in the Courses Tab within My Manchester login.manchester.ac.uk

Please note that swapping or dropping full-year optional modules is prohibited after week 2 of semester 1.
