



Visitors' Centre/University Place
A
Contains teaching rooms, lecture theatres, restaurants and the University's Visitors' Centre. The Atrium provides support information, advice and guidance and a careers service for students.



Jean McFarlane Building
B
Home to the School of Nursing, Midwifery and Social Work. Jean McFarlane developed a degree course and established the country's first professional nursing unit.



Alan Turing Building
C
Houses the School of Mathematics, the Photon Science Institute and the Jodrell Bank Centre for Astrophysics, and contains teaching facilities and state-of-the-art research laboratories.




Kilburn Building
D
Opened in 1972 and named after Tom Kilburn, one of the makers of the world's first stored-programme computer, this building is home to the School of Computer Science.



Waterloo Place
E
A row of redbrick Grade II-listed Georgian houses. Before the post-war development period, much of Oxford Road looked like this.

Manchester Business School
F
The largest campus-based school in the UK, with around 2,000 students and over 200 teaching staff.



Arthur Lewis Building
G
Home to the School of Social Sciences and the School of Environment, Education and Development, the building is designed to minimise environmental impact. Photovoltaic cells on the roof provide electricity throughout the year.



Rutherford Building
I
Ernest Rutherford was awarded the Nobel Prize for Chemistry in 1908. His greatest discoveries of the atomic nucleus and splitting of the atom were made in this building.



Manchester Museum
H
Houses a large collection of ancient Egyptian artifacts, natural history artifacts and cultural displays. Meet the live amphibians and reptiles in the award-winning vivarium.




Martin Harris Centre for Music and Drama

The centre offers a fantastic contemporary space to study and perform. It incorporates a 350-seat theatre and a 150-seat theatre, and an electroacoustic music studio.




Dental Hospital/School of Dentistry

The School of Dentistry incorporates two high-spec clinical skills labs, state-of-the-art teaching facilities and a range of comfortable workspaces for students.



The Old Quadrangle
L
The oldest part of the University and designed by Alfred Waterhouse. Grade II-listed, it comprises three buildings: The John Owens Building contains many of the Universities administrative offices. The Whitworth Building contains the stunning Whitworth Hall, which is used for graduation ceremonies. Originally the Owens College library, the Christie Building is the perfect place for lunch or a coffee and a catch-up with friends.



Alan Gilbert Learning Commons
M
A state-of-the-art learning facility, open 24-7. It houses 400 fixed workstations, breakout areas and workspaces with multimedia facilities.



Samuel Alexander Building
O
Home to the School of Arts, Languages and Cultures. The inscription over the entrance, 'Arduus Ad Solem', means 'striving towards the sun'.



Michael Smith & AV Hill Buildings
P & Q
Teaching and research facilities for biologists, pharmacists and medical researchers. Scientists worked closely with architects to provide a building that would encourage collaboration between research groups.



Stopford Building
R
Manchester Medical School and the Faculty of Life Sciences are based here. The facilities include large teaching laboratories, lecture theatres, teaching rooms and the Stopford Library.



The Academy
S
Hosts concerts, events and gigs throughout the year – attracting the latest big-name and up-and-coming bands.



Students' Union
T
The biggest in the UK and run by students for students. Contains a bar, a cafe, three music venues, plus meeting rooms for societies and clubs.

Sackville Street Campus

Walking time about 20 mins from University Place

This area is home to the Schools of Electrical and Electronic Engineering and Mechanical Aerospace and Civil Engineering, and our Textiles department.

U The Sackville Street Building is a gem nestled in our Sackville Street Campus. The building is home to the Joule Library and the Godlee Observatory.

V The Manchester Institute of Biotechnology is based at the John Garside Building. This purpose-built interdisciplinary research institute is home to an interdisciplinary community of researchers.

W Under the archway you'll find the statue of Archimedes in his bath by Thompson Dagnall. This is neighboured by three apple trees said to have been grown from cuttings taken from apple trees in Sir Isaac Newton's garden. The Vimto monument was carved by Kerry Morrison and installed in Granby Row in 1992. This was the site of the factory where the first batch of Vimto was made by John Noel Nichols back in 1908.



Main Library
N
With over 4 million printed books and manuscripts, over 29,000 unique electronic journals, 414,000 electronic books and several hundred databases this is the largest single site university library in the UK. There are several study areas, computer clusters and group rooms.
