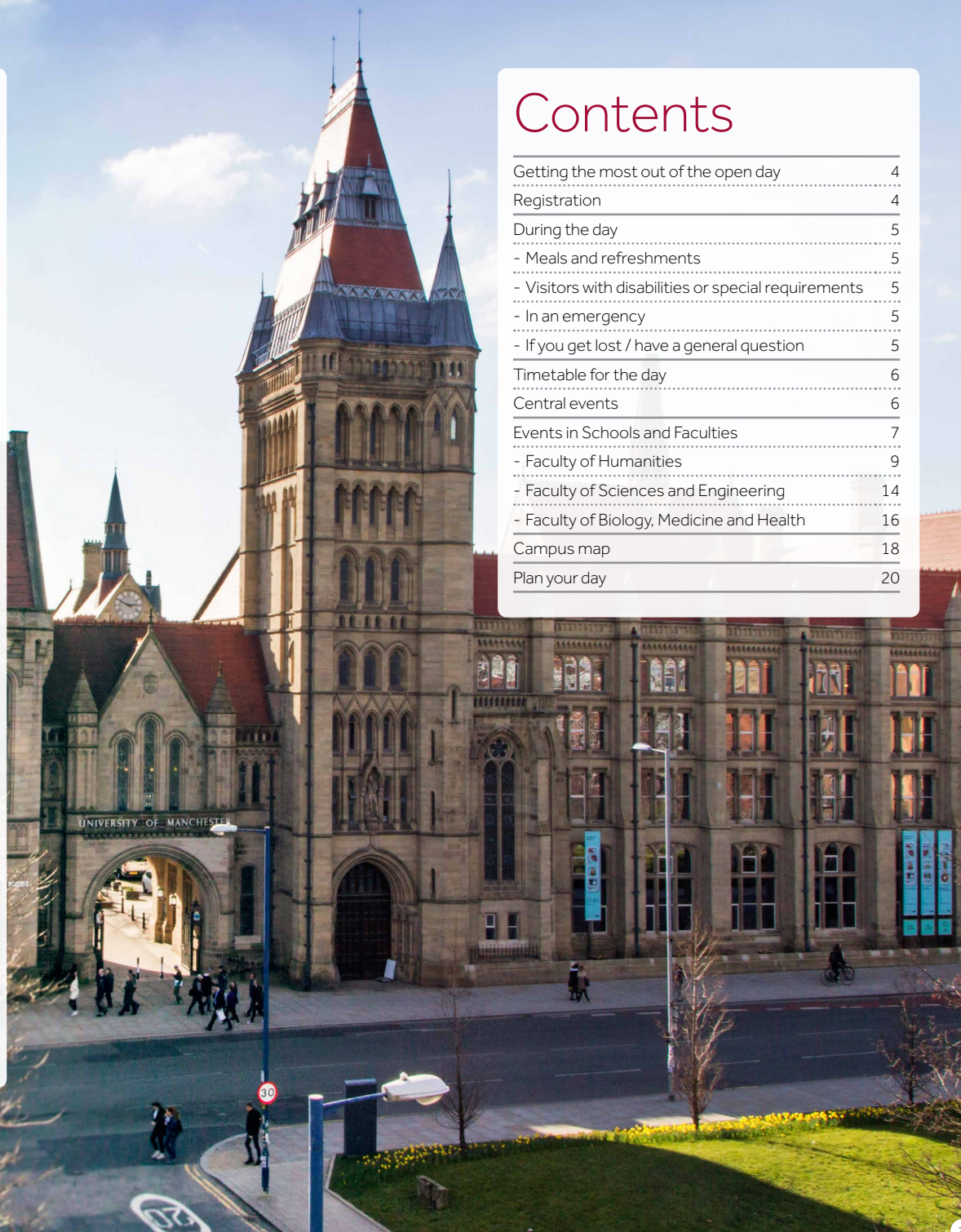
I hope you enjoy the day and take the opportunity to speak to our current students to hear their experiences, and to take some time to see some of our world-class facilities and resources on campus.

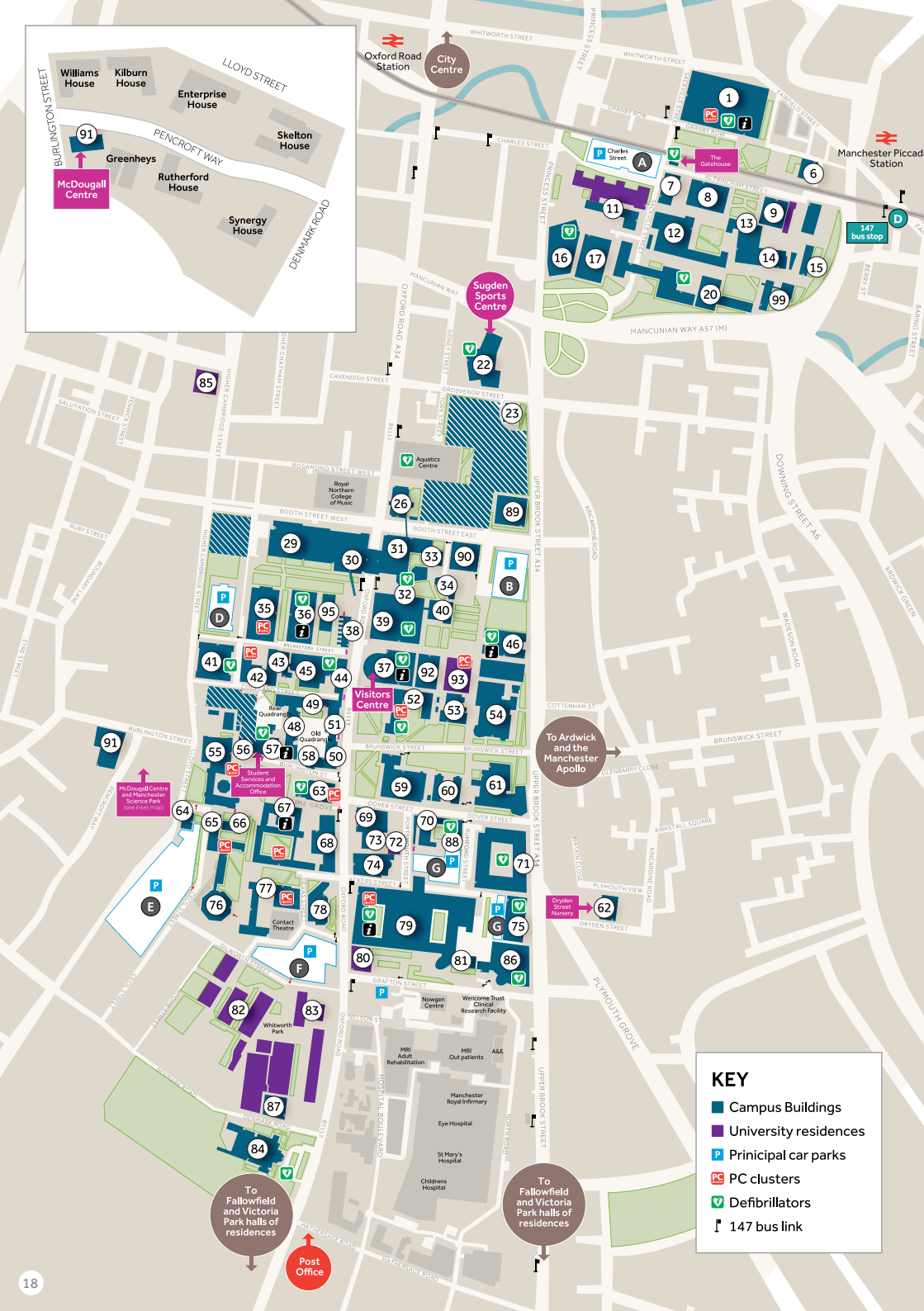
