(Reference Book Collection, Level 4, Central Library)

There is a wealth of information in Manchester Central Library which you can use to supplement the specialist Race Relations Resource Centre collections. In particular, the Reference Book Collection (Level 4) includes much which is of interest.

This list includes details of a selection of items, along with a brief description of each one. Among other things, it encompasses international and country-specific studies; books helpful in gaining an understanding of such things as Britain's imperial past and British political attitudes to immigration and race relations; material useful to understanding the development and rise of racism and its

manifestations; the work of literary writers; essays, studies and revisionings of theoretical approaches; the impact of religion on cultures, and its uses in the development of cultural identity; the history, impact and course of apartheid in South Africa; and histories of British BME communities.

Not all items on the list are palatable: a number of items are included which advocate views and use terminologies which many today would find objectionable. But each of the items is helpful in gaining a deeper understanding of issues related to race, ethnicity and migration.
