Civil Conflict and Antipoverty Programmes: Effects on Demobilisation

1300-1400hrs, Nile Room, 1st floor - Arthur Lewis building

Antipoverty programmes have been successful in helping millions of people afford better livelihoods. While this is well known, little research has yet been conducted that examines the power of such programmes to influence outcomes in times of conflict, especially in countries where antipoverty programmes are implemented amidst disputes against illegal armed groups. This paper focuses on the implementation of *Familias en Accion*, a flagship antipoverty programme in Colombia during the early 2000s when the country was experiencing the crudest peak in its long-lasting internal conflict. Results indicate that the programme had positive effects on the demobilisation of combatants. The theoretical transmission channels of these effects are discussed and contrasted with the existing empirical evidence


If you have never participated in a SUAW this is how it works:

"Arthur Lewis in the Twenty-First Century: Growth and Structural Transformation in Emerging Economies" A conference to celebrate the centenary of Sir W Arthur Lewis, 1915 - 1991.

William Arthur Lewis was the Stanley Jevons Professor of Political Economy at the Victoria University of Manchester, in the Faculty of Economic and Social Studies, from 1948 until 1957.

During this time, he published his seminal work in Development and Growth Economics for which he was awarded the Nobel Memorial Prize in Economics in 1979, jointly with Theodore Schultz.


