

Peer Assisted Study Support (PASS)



Hello and welcome to Manchester. We are Patrick and Anna, third year music students and PASS co-ordinators for the Music Scheme next year. We can't wait to meet you all! To help you find your feet academically, socially and in any other way we can, you will be invited to weekly PASS sessions run by second and third year students.

The sessions are a chance for you to engage in and form great friendships in a non-judgemental

discussions, ask questions and form great friendships in a non-judgemental, relaxed environment. Our carefully selected and dedicated leaders are in the best position to answer your queries about academic work and life in Manchester, having just completed their first year journeys on which which you are about to embark. The leaders will prepare beforehand one or two activities on subjects that you have chosen – maybe about aural skills, musicology, etc. – and you will go through them together in the session. The aim is that the leaders facilitate discussion about the activities but that it is you who work your way to the answers, aided by the ideas of your peers. There's no need to worry about making mistakes, and no pressure in these sessions; we've all been in your position, and aim to build your confidence levels in every aspect.

Starting your university career as a Music student, there'll be auditions, rehearsals and concerts to attend throughout the week, and a whole set of amazing socials planned for you in the evenings. These will range from whole-department events to smaller socials with your tutor group: we can definitely promise something for everyone and plenty of opportunities to get to know your peers. This section of the booklet will provide you with everything you need to know for Welcome Week.

Monday 21st September

10:30am

Students meet in the foyer of the Martin Harris Centre for tea and coffee. Here you will get the opportunity to meet your Student Mentors (Mums and Dads), the other members of your tutor group and your first-year peers.

11:00am

Head of the Music Department Dr Camden Reeves will welcome new students with a short introductory talk in the Cosmo Rodewald Concert Hall.

12:15pm

Your student mentors will take tutor groups to meet their Academic Advisors.

1:00pm

The department provides lunch for you and your mentors in G16. This is a great informal opportunity to socialise, chat and ask any questions.

2:00pm

Student Mentors will give each tutor group a tour of the Martin Harris Centre and the surrounding buildings, including the Library, Students Union and Alan Gilbert Learning Commons.

3:00pm

A meeting for all Joint Course students will take place with Camden Reeves in SU20 in the Martin Harris Centre.

5:30pm onwards

Individual auditions will begin to take place in the Martin Harris Centre.

9:00am - 5:00pm Auditions continue in the Martin Harris Centre.

2:00pm The School of Arts, Languages and Cultures offers a welcome talk to new students (location to be confirmed).

Students will attend a timetable meeting during which you will meet all of the Music Department staff. They will explain your timetable and teaching arrangements in greater detail as well as giving you the latest news from the department and the exciting plans for the new academic year.

1:30pm - 5:00pm

Auditions will continue to take place in the Martin Harris Centre and Welcome Concert rehearsals may still be taking place in the Cosmo Rodewald Concert Hall. Don't worry if you have a clash: students with an audition during this time will be allowed to leave the rehearsal in plenty of time to make their allocated audition slot.

Auditions

Every new music student will undertake an audition in Welcome Week, but don't panic - this is nothing at all to worry about! The auditioning panel will be made up of an orchestral conductor from the University, a member of University staff and the friendly third-year student MUMS personnel team who assist in choosing players for Music Society concerts. The audition will consist of:

- One piece which you have prepared it can be anything that shows us your level of playing. You may well not be required to play the entire thing.
 Don't worry if you are stopped: it is only to ensure that we have time to hear everyone.
- Audition excerpts which will be available to prepare in advance. This is so
 that we can allocate you to our ensembles fairly.

 These will be available to all students to view during Summer at
 http://mumusicsociety.co.uk/auditions.
- An informal chat so that you can be matched to the best instrumental teacher for you at the university, and so we can get to know you better.

If you are a singer or interested in singing, then you need to sign up for a vocal audition for the MUMS choirs. These will consist of one prepared song, a piece of sight-singing and an informal chat about prior experience. These auditions will take place in front of the choral conductors and managers.

If you play more than one instrument, you will have to choose one as your first study. This is the instrument on which you will be assessed in performance recitals and for which you will receive free tuition. There will still be plenty of opportunities to play your second instrument. If you want to audition for both orchestral playing and singing, you need to sign up for both sets of auditions. If you want to be considered for an instrumental ensemble on your second instrument as well as your first, you need to sign up for an additional audition on this second instrument.

Students that play orchestral doubling instruments (eg. piccolo, cor anglais etc.) should prepare the audition excerpts for these instruments if they wish to be considered for relevant orchestral places. The MUMS personnel team will take these into account when deciding orchestral seating throughout the year.

MUMS Welcome Concert

The MUMS Welcome Concert will take place on Sunday 4th October, and is

compulsory for all music students. It doesn't matter if you are a first-study singer

or instrumentalist: everyone is involved by singing in the Freshers' Chorus, a great

way to meet other people in your year group and be involved in the department's

music-making right from the start! This year's chosen piece is Mozart's Solemn

Vespers of a Confessor, K.339, which will be performed by the Freshers' Chorus

and MUMS Symphony Orchestra conducted by Justin Doyle.

All rehearsals will take place in the Cosmo Rodewald Concert Hall in the Martin

Harris Centre, and must be attended. A more detailed rehearsal schedule will be

provided by the department upon your arrival in Manchester. For now, during

Welcome Week and the following week, the provisional rehearsal schedule is as

follows:

MUMS and Music Department Socials

Meeting and socialising with your fellow music students is an integral part of Welcome Week - they'll become a second family to you here at university, and both MUMS and the Music Department are putting on a wide variety of social activities for you to get better acquainted with your peers.

Your welcome week activities will include (plus much more):

MUMS Three-Legged Pub Crawl

What better way to get to know someone than to be taped at the ankles for an entire evening? That's the philosophy behind the annual three-legged pub crawl that sees the whole Music Department struggle down Oxford Road together. The parcel tape will appear in the first bar and from then on you'll be inseparable. Be sure to wear long trousers (ouch...) and sensible shoes - no need to make it any more difficult than it already will be! There'll be lots of staggering guaranteed. Even if you're not drinking – and there's certainly no pressure to – this is a highly entertaining evening that you really shouldn't miss. This social is a great way to meet Music students from all year groups, as well as members of MUMS that don't study music (they're just as lovely as us). Information about this social will be given to you by your Mums and Dads in Welcome Week. They'll sort out a meeting place so you can venture out to the first bar in your families.

Family Curry

Organised by your Mums and Dads, tutor groups go out for a family meal one evening down Manchester's famous Curry Mile - home to some of the nicest Indian restaurants you'll ever find. This is a lovely, relaxed evening that gives you the opportunity to socialise with your Peer Mentors and fellow first year Music students over some exceptional and very affordable food - a nice treat if cooking for yourself hasn't been going all that well. Restaurants tend to offer a wide range of options, so this can be enjoyed even if you're not a spice fan. Your Peer Mentors will give you specific details of times and places within your tutor groups, and MUMS will be running their own social events afterwards, which all families are welcome to join.

Getting around: The Martin Harris Centre

The Martin Harris Centre for Music and Drama is where you'll be spending most of your time for lectures, seminars, tutorials and rehearsals. The Music Department is mostly based on the south side of the building. Room numbers indicate the floor: LG (lower ground = basement), G (ground level), F (first floor), SL (second-lower floor – Drama Department), SU (second-upper floor which is the third/top floor in the lift). The John Casken Lecture Theatre (SL26) is where most of your lectures will be and can be accessed from both the SL and SU floors.

Practice rooms on the ground, first and third floors can be booked via a new online system. A maximum of seven hours can be booked per person per week. Also on the ground floor is the percussion room reserved exclusively for first study percussionists. There are also practice rooms in the basement which operate on a first-come, first-served basis, becoming newly available on the hour. Secure instrument store cupboards can be found on the ground floor and in the basement. The ground floor store cupboard is reserved specifically for cellos, double basses, tubas, harps and other large instruments.

The Cosmo Rodewald Concert Hall and the John Thaw Studio Theatre are the two main performance spaces in the department. Both are located via the foyer on the ground floor.

The first floor is home to the undergraduate computer cluster where you have access to PCs, Macs, a printer/photocopier, scanner and binding machine. There are also vending machines (perhaps the most important part so far!) located on the third floor, by the lift and the upper entrance to the John Casken Lecture Theatre.

The building can seem like a little bit of a maze for the first few days. Mentors will give you a tour of the building on your first day, and students are always hanging around the department and happy show you the way.

As well as the Peer Mentors, there are plenty of other ways in which you will be supported through the transition into University life. The rest of this guide will introduce you to the Music students who organise study sessions and to the team that runs MUMS - Manchester University Music Society.

Manchester University Music Society

Manchester University Music Society (MUMS) is both one of the largest and most active societies in the country, with over 400 members and over 50 concerts a year. It is completely student-run, from the committee to the concert managers and the conductors. The wide range of ensembles includes:

- · Symphony Orchestra
- · Chamber Orchestra
- String Orchestra
- Wind Orchestra (MUWO)
- · Big Band
- Brass Band
- Ad Solem (chamber choir)
- Vaganza (contemporary music ensemble)

These offer an unrivalled range of ensemble performance opportunities. Additionally, there is the lunchtime concert series which takes place on a Wednesday or Friday. These concerts provide extra opportunities for soloists and chamber ensembles.

There is an annual membership fee of £15 which will more than pay for itself by the free tickets to MUMS concerts and discounted socials offered to members. Sign-up will take place both in the start of year auditions and at the MUMS stall at the Freshers' Fair. For more information, please visit www.mumusicsociety.co.uk.







Other Societies

Manchester University Chorus

Manchester University Chorus is a mixed-ability choir open to both student and non-student members of the public. There are no auditions, and we put on two concerts each year - one each at the end of the Autumn and Spring semesters. This year we have some very exciting rep lined up, as well as socials and other opportunities. An auditioned choir of around 60 singers named The Cosmo Singers also work with our conductors and perform in all our concerts as well as MUMS concerts. Please note attendance at Chorus is mandatory for all principal study singers taking performance and members of The Cosmo Singers.

Rehearsals are on a Tuesday night, 7 - 9pm in the Martin Harris Centre. To join all you need to do is come along to the first rehearsal and give it a go; signing up usually happens in the second and third rehearsals. This means there are no obligations on the first night - just a chance to have some fun and get to know your fellow singers a bit better.

University of Manchester Musical Theatre Society (UMMTS)

UMMTS is Manchester University's Musical Theatre Society. We put on a show every semester along with our showcase choir and socials.

We audition for all our shows, but there are also many other roles available on the production team or as part of the band. We will be running a stall at the Freshers' Fair so come find us to see what exciting plans we have for this year and to sign up. Manchester University Jazz Orchestra (MUJO)

MUJO is one of the university's big bands, playing a variety of jazz, swing, soul and pop tunes throughout the year at various balls and socials. In the last 12 months we've played at the Palace Hotel, The Ram in Fallowfield (formerly 'Ram and Shackle'), the university barracks, Antwerp Mansion and the Students' Union's festival 'Pangea', often teaming up with acts like the Skalactites and the Manchester Harmony Gospel Choir (check them out).

MUJO is a separate society from MUMS and we'll be recruiting at the Freshers' Fair. We'll be auditioning standard big band instruments: saxes, trombones, trumpets, guitar, keys, bass (upright and electric) and drums/percussion. Vocalists may be auditioned later once the band has had the chance to rehearse, but should still register their interest now to keep informed.

Manchester University Barbershop Singers (MUBS)

Manchester University Barbershop Singers is a growing society dedicated to high quality a cappella barbershop singing. We are looking for new members for both our men's and ladies' choruses, and no - you don't need to own a straw hat and striped waistcoat to join! We perform a range of new arrangements and classic barbershop charts, complete with energetic choreography. Throughout the year we perform in three formal concerts, in addition to numerous other performance opportunities around the university, such as the Student Union's Beerfest and Singing Valentines.

Singing with MUBS is a great place to enjoy singing in a relaxed and friendly atmosphere alongside students from wide-ranging disciplines, and we welcome people of a vast range of experience levels, from first-study singers to people who are entirely new to singing. If you're already interested, then like our Facebook page (Manchester University Barbershop Singers) and keep an eye out for us around campus in Welcome Week and in the Freshers' Fair.
