

In some countries the people who make them often get just pence for their production and have poor working conditions.


The dress opposite illustrates the story of a factory in Bangladesh.

Mix it up


We've been searching far and wide for the perfect shade of green.

Can you find Gustav Metzger's sculpture, *Flailing Trees*?


I'm upside down facing the ground,

to caring for the environment.




Save our Snowman

We have all learnt from school how to reduce, reuse and recycle.


Here are some of our ideas for how to be green at home.
