- 1. Welcome & Introductions. The group introduced themselves and welcomed new members
- 2. Minutes & Matters arising. There were no minutes of the previous meeting as the July network meeting did not take place. Any matters arising from the March meeting are in the notes.
- 2.1 U of M school governor membership figures update (AG)
 - There are now **166** members of staff in the network, an increase of 14 since the March Network meeting and an increase of 7 since July.
 - 147 Alumni have now been placed by SGOSS as governors across England. This added to the Alumni baseline of 125 gives total Alumni network of **272** and a total network figure of **438** (staff and Alumni). The faculty breakdown (staff only) is below. These are taken from the APR submission to the planning office in July 2015. Figures are based on 161 staff governors. The total number of governors in the university equates to 1.3% of the total staff population.

7. Open Forum

At this network meeting we had 3 governors contribute in the open forum.

- 1. Brendon Jones talked about his new role on the Manchester Schools Forum and thanked colleagues who voted for him in the elections. This is predominantly a finance related role and Brendon will send updates where necessary.
- 2. Fiona Lynch gave a brief overview of the Manchester Access Programme and asked governors to remind sixth forms and colleges that applications are now open for Year 12 pupils and to remind secondary schools that Greater Manchester pupils currently in Year 11 should be aware of MAP so that they can take the opportunity to apply as soon as they reach Year 12.
- 3. Christine McLean and her research student Evelyn (Evie) Gregory introduced a very important piece of research that Evie is carrying out. The research seeks to explore different issues surrounding governance, accountability and the management of performance within primary and secondary schools. This work will continue some of the research started with the Skills Survey and governors are asked to contact Evie if they would be prepared to spend 30 minutes answering some face to face questions for her research project. 8. AOB

- We were recently re-accredited by the **BITC** for our Responsible Business Award 2015 and received a School Recruitment Award from the Education Business Award Commended, to recognise successful investment in education.
- There is a vacancy on the governing body at **Gorsey Bank Primary in Wilmlsow**. Please let colleagues know and ask them to contact me if they are interested.
- There are also governor vacancies with **The Manchester Federation of EBSD Schools** which consists of two Key Stage 2/3 centres (9-14); Southern Cross and Meade Hill and two Key Stage 4 centres (14-16); Castlefield Campus and Wythenshawe Campus, and a residential special school for pupils from 7 to 16; Buglawton Hall School. All the pupils have to have a statement or Education Health and Care Plan which is reviewed annually. The statement or plan will name social, emotional and mental health difficulties as their primary need. Most of the pupils have a diagnosis of ADHD.
