

The New North & South Network

To mark this year's 70th anniversary of the creation of India, Pakistan, and later Bangladesh, Manchester is showing an extensive programme of South Asian art and culture in a series of venues across the city. This is part of the work of the New North & South network, involving 10 organisations in the North of England and South Asia. They are collaborating in a 3 year project to show some of the most exciting art from South Asia in Manchester, Leeds and Liverpool as well as in Bangladesh, India, Pakistan and Sri Lanka.

Manchester Art Gallery

South Asian Design 19 May 2017–10 June 2018

The Design Gallery features South Asian craft and fashion from India, Pakistan, Bangladesh and Sri Lanka spanning three centuries. Each country is famous for its vibrant regional costumes, luxurious textiles and intricately detailed ceramic, stone or metal ornaments. Colour and surface pattern are used with intensity inspired by subjects ranging from spirituality to food and from current affairs to kitsch. The exhibition explores how the region's traditional crafts are inspiring contemporary art, design and fashion. International highlights include contemporary art by Adeela Suleman, fashion by Tarun Tahiliani and Manish Arora and product design by Cobalt Studios, Rubberband and Tippoi.

Memories of Partition 15 August 2017–January 2018

Find out about the experiences and legacies of the creation of India and Pakistan in 1947, through the memories of members of Manchester's South Asian communities. The partition of India led to the largest mass migration in human history, with an estimated 15 million people being displaced. The world-changing impact of partition remains relatively unexplored by museums across the UK. *Memories of Partition* will address this by revealing the untold stories of partition on local communities, multiculturalism and migration.

Celebrating Ganesha 2 September 2017 –8 January 2018

Manchester Museum is delighted to host the beautiful stone sculpture of Ganesha. *Celebrating Ganesha* is touring across several venues around the UK as part of the British Museum's Partnership Spotlight Loans programme. The elephant-headed Ganesha is one of the most popular Hindu gods - the creator and remover of obstacles. Standing on a lotus pedestal, Ganesha is depicted with a lion mask above his head, snakes as anklets and his rat 'vahana', his vehicle, at his feet.

Sooni Taraporevala Home in the City, Bombay 1976-Mumbai 2016 4 March 2017–28 January 2018

Photographer, screenwriter and filmmaker Sooni Taraporevala presents a series of photographs depicting life in Bombay/Mumbai over four decades. Capturing the city in which she grew up, Taraporevala's images, cutting across class and community lines, are an insider's affectionate view. The images, complex, intimate and quirky, celebrate the odd and the everyday and are a significant contribution to the social history of one of India's most diverse cities.

Guest-curated by Siddharth Dhanvant Shanghvi, for Sunaparanta, Goa Centre for the Arts, with patronage from Dattaraj & Dipti Salgaocar.

The display is accompanied by a new text by essayist and travel writer Pico lyer.

Beyond Borders 20 May 2017-3 June 2018

Beyond Borders explores South Asian textiles, bringing together four artists working on issues around post-colonial identity, fragmentation, authenticity, displacement and belonging. These artists are based in Bangladesh, England, India and Pakistan having developed artworks around these concerns, experimenting with a range of media such as textiles, fibres, embroidery, film, photography and performance.

Artists: Raisa Kabir (England), Yasmin Nupur (Bangladesh), Risham Syed (Pakistan) and CONA (a Foundation, artist-driven, not-for-profit, based in India).

Raqib Shaw 24 June–19 November 2017

A solo exhibition by contemporary artist Raqib Shaw examines the real and imagined spaces between the East and West.

Shaw's opulent paintings of fantastical worlds are combined with historic textiles, furniture and drawings from the Whitworth collection. The exhibition takes the form of an installation, drawing on influences of renaissance and baroque imagery, combined with theatrical extravagance, nature and poetry, to echo the mythic space Shaw creates in his paintings. New wallpaper designed by Shaw, commissioned specially for the exhibition, creates an extraordinary backdrop for his work.

Co-curated by Dr. Maria Balshaw, Director of Tate, Diana Campbell Betancourt, Director of Dhaka Art Summit, and the artist. The exhibition will be reimagined for the South Asian context of the Dhaka Art Summit, Bangladesh 2018.


