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This guide will provide you with information about the structure of your degree programme, where to find course outlines, and how to make your selections on the Student System via My Manchester.

Students studying on the master's programme (LLM or MA) must take 120 credits of taught course units and a 60 credit dissertation.

Students studying on the postgraduate diploma must take 120 credits of taught course units.

Students studying on the postgraduate certificate must take 60 credits of taught course units.

Students on the full time LLM Health Care Ethics & Law programme must take taught course units to a total value of 120 credits. Students should take 60 credits in each semester.

Students who are considering requesting to upgrade to the MA or LLM should keep in mind that eligibility for the LLM depends on having chosen/taken at least 45 credits of law-based options, in addition to "Medico-Legal Problems". To be eligible to upgrade to the MA programme, they would need to have chosen/taken at least 30 credits of ethics-based options in addition to "Philosophical Bioethics".

LLM Health Care Ethics & Law (part-time)

Students on the part-time LLM Health Care Ethics & Law programme must take taught course units to a total value of 120 credits over the two years of study. Students should normally take 60 credits in each year.

In semester one of year one, one of the following two compulsory course units must be selected (the course unit not selected must be taken in year two):

Students who are considering requesting to upgrade to the MA or LLM should keep in mind that eligibility for the LLM depends on having chosen/taken at least 45 credits of law-based options, in addition to Medico-Legal Problems". To be eligible to upgrade to the MA programme, they would need to have chosen/taken at least 30 credits of ethics-based options in addition to "Philosophical Bioethics".

When to Select Course Units

You will be automatically enrolled on the core course units for your degree programme by the Teaching and Student Support Office. You will need to select your chosen optional course units using the Student System via My Manchester.


You will be able to select your optional course units from 10am on Monday 4 September 2017. You should select your optional course units for both semester 1 and semester 2 for the 2017-18 academic year.

Although you are asked to select optional course units upon registration in September, you will be allowed to change your optional course units within a limited period of time. From the beginning of teaching in each semester, a period of two weeks is permitted in which your election of optional course units can change.

This means that the final selection of semester one course units must be made by **Friday 6 October 2017** and the final selection of semester two course units must be made by **Friday 9 February 2018**.

How to Select Course Units

You should follow this section if you wish to enrol on course units. If you need to swap a course unit for another select the **SWAP** tab in step 5 below instead of add. You will then need to select the course unit you wish to change and search for the course unit you wish to enrol on instead.

12. In most cases you will need to select a related tutorial/workshop/seminar etc. There may be more classes to choose from than initially appear on screen – if there are you should click **view all sections**.

14. The next screen will show what you have chosen. You are not enrolled yet, click **NEXT**



15. The next screen will confirm your selection, now you can add more classes (by clicking search and follow from step 7), or to finish, click **PROCEED TO STEP 2 OF 3**.

Remember you are not yet enrolled so if there are limited spaces on a course unit you may wish to proceed to step 2 or 3 and select further course units later.

Errors when Enrolling – Unable to Add Class

If you receive an error message to indicate you have been unable to add your selected course unit, below are details of how to resolve some common issues.

Error	Reason	Action
Timetable conflicts	There is a clash between classes you have selected/are already enrolled on.	Clashes are not permitted and you must select a different class. If the clash includes a clash with a seminar, you may be able to change your seminar selection in order to enrol on the class. Please note clashes are not permitted in the University. If a clash is unavoidable you must change your course unit. If the clash involves a seminar but all other seminar groups are full, please email law.timetabling@manchester.ac.uk . Please remember to include your name, student ID number, and full details of your issue. The Timetabling Officer will check to see if there is any space to add you to another seminar group that fits with your timetable. If this is not possible you will need to select a different course unit.
Course is at full capacity (blue square symbol is shown when selecting class)	The course unit is full and there is no space for additional students.	You need to select a different course unit. The School of Law does not operate a wait list. You can check the Student System regularly to see if a space becomes available. For course units outside the School of Law, please check with the School offering the course unit to see if they operate a wait list.
Service indicator	A negative service indicator is usually associated with a debt to the University. Please note that the lecture grids will include all course units available for the degree programme.

Personalised Timetable

There is a timetable on the Student System, which shows your courses, but it does not show rooms. This timetable updates immediately so it is a useful reference point when you are trying to select your course units (and resolve any timetables clashes if applicable).

However, you must check your personalised My Manchester timetable for the location of your classes. You access this timetable go to the My Home tab on [My Manchester](#). Timetables will go live just before the start of the first semester.

IMPORTANT: Once you've selected course units/made changes to your course units, your My Manchester timetable usually takes between 24 and 48 hours to update. It does not update immediately. If you need to know the location of a class, check the notice boards on the third floor of the Williamson Building.

Not all timetabled activities will run on a weekly basis so it is important you check your timetable online. You can view your timetable by semester, but we would strongly encourage you to check your weekly timetable each week.
