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# **Manchester Art Gallery**



South Asian Design 19 May 2017–10 June 2018

The Design Gallery focuses on craft and fashion from India, Pakistan, Bangladesh and Sri Lanka spanning three centuries. Each country is famous for its vibrant regional costumes, luxurious textiles and intricately detailed ceramic, stone or metal ornaments. Colour and surface pattern are used with intensity inspired by subjects ranging from spirituality to food and from current affairs to kitsch. The exhibition explores how the region's traditional crafts are inspiring contemporary art, design and fashion. International highlights include contemporary art by Adeela Suleman, fashion by Tarun Tahiliani and Manish Arora and product design by Cobalt Studios, Rubberband and Tippoi.

Neha Choksi 30 September 2017 –25 February 2018

Neha Choksi sets up simple yet memorable situations to create poetic, absurd and psychologically engaging works. Her new multi-channel film installation features the artist and her friends. Exploring the relationship between herself and her community, she tests her belief that to learn to be oneself, one always needs others. The film has been shot on the construction site for an expansive and modernising Jain ashram in India. Inventing open ended and playful situations for her participants, Choksi examines the connections and tensions between solitude and collaboration.

# Waqas Khan 30 September 2017 –25 February 2018

Waqas Khan's minimalist drawings resemble webs and celestial expanses. Inspired by patterns of biological organic growth and also by the lives and literature of sufi poets, his work is a meditation on life, togetherness and the universe. His contemplation is made visible in ink on paper and his work invites our contemplation. In a carefully created installation, the visitor is led around the space from small scale drawings, to a large scale floor based work, to new drawings made especially for Manchester.

Mehreen Murtaza 30 September 2017 –4 February 2018

Mehreen Murtaza will fill one of the galleries with living plants for a new work exploring plant communication and consciousness. Through in-depth research, Murtaza has developed a unique narrative and sound installation which blurs the boundaries between plant neurobiology, science fiction, philosophy and spirituality to create a space that hovers between fiction and non-fiction.

Hetain Patel 30 September 2017 -4 February 2018

Hetain Patel will exhibit two film works, *The Jump* 2015 and *Don't Look At The Finger* 2017. Each film employs the artist's characteristic sense of humour and the scale of a Hollywood production. *Don't Look At The Finger* presents a wedding ceremony where the protagonists seek human connection through ritual combat and signed languages. *The Jump* features Patel's homemade replica Spider-Man costume and connects the fantasy of action and superhero films with the domestic setting of his British Indian family home in Bolton.

Don't Look at the Finger is a new commission by Film and Video Umbrella with Manchester Art Gallery and QUAD. Supported by Arts Council England.

Risham Syed 30 September 2017 –25 February 2018

Risham Syed's exquisite postcard sized paintings show the ever changing urban landscape in Lahore, Pakistan, Instead of idealised postcard images for tourists, Syed depicts the construction work which transforms her home city. The recently built houses in Lahore's new residential guarters have perfectly finished facades but unfinished back walls. She reveals these darker, neglected areas which are not for public view. Other sculptural works, shown amid Manchester Art Gallery's historic collection, include paintings inspired by newspaper images and diverse objects such as domestic ornaments and Victorian furniture. These works reference historical and political shifts in education. architecture and gender roles, exploring Pakistan's cultural inheritance, collective memory and colonial history.

Tentative Collective will host a performance lecture focusing on a workshop in Karachi where three brothers, the third generation of Ahmeddin and Sons, continue to make immaculately hand crafted caps, while the city speeds and moves elsewhere. The artists' project explores ideas of progress and development, shifting economies and the changing pace of a globalised, neoliberal city. Amidst all this, where do the three Ahmeddin brothers stand?

Memories of Partition 15 August 2017 –25 February 2018

Sooni Taraporevala Home in the City, Bombay 1976 –Mumbai 2016 4 March 2017–28 January 2018

Photographer, screenwriter and filmmaker Sooni Taraporevala presents a series of photographs depicting life in Bombay/Mumbai over four decades. Capturing the city in which she grew up, Taraporevala's images, cutting across class and community lines, are an insider's affectionate view. The images, complex, intimate and quirky, celebrate the odd and the everyday and are a significant contribution to the social history of one of India's most diverse cities.

Raqib Shaw 24 June–19 November 2017

A solo exhibition by contemporary artist Ragib Shaw examines the real and imagined spaces between the East and West. Shaw's opulent paintings of fantastical worlds are combined with historic textiles, furniture and drawings from the Whitworth collection. The exhibition takes the form of an installation. drawing on influences of Renaissance and Barogue imagery, combined with theatrical extravagance, nature and poetry, to echo the mythic space Shaw creates in his paintings. New wallpaper designed by Shaw, commissioned specially for the exhibition, creates an extraordinary backdrop for his work.

Co-curated by Dr. Maria Balshaw, Director of Tate, Diana Campbell Betancourt, Director of Dhaka Art Summit, and the artist. The exhibition will be reimagined for the South Asian context of the Dhaka Art Summit, Bangladesh 2018.

Raqs Media Collective: Twilight Language 30 September 2017 –25 February 2018

In their first major UK exhibition, Rags Media Collective unravel worlds, make questions, haunt memorials, and follow the tangled threads of histories and emancipation. Through new and existing work, Twilight Language signals a lighthouse semaphore for all that is lost and found between errant longitudes, infected histories and contagious futures. Touched by the eddies of time in Manchester, works include a lighthouse that signals the semaphore of twilight language, portraits of guardians of the city's history, and the fluttering of the Peppered Moth through geologic time. The exhibition will provide an exceptional opportunity to experience Rags Media Collective's ideas, insights and art.




# Apna: Ours Yours Everybody's 30 September 2017 –21 January 2018

Telling a story of women between two worlds, this Collections Centre display is a collaborative project between the Whitworth and Apna, a South Asian arts group based in Rossendale. Objects from the Whitworth's collection are displayed alongside work produced by South Asian women working with Apna, seeking to maintain and revitalise traditions that may otherwise be lost when cultures combine.

Apna is a word used in many languages across South Asia meaning 'ours, yours or everybody's'. This reflects the inclusive nature of the Whitworth's Collections Centre, where everyone is welcome to explore and learn.

South Asian Modernists 1953-63 30 September 2017 –15 April 2018

South Asian Modernists explores the works of Pakistani and Indian artists who worked with Victor Musgrave between 1953-63. Musgrave ran the experimental Gallery One space where South Asia's most eminent modernist artists were exhibited. Amongst the most important exhibitions held was Seven Indian Painters in Europe (1958), which received critical acclaim and introduced Indian artists to the British market.

Drawing on works from the 1953–63 period, these modernist paintings are shown alongside photographs by the renowned photographer Ida Kar, capturing the creative atmosphere of the age.
