Manchester School of Architecture ranked 7th in the world, according to a respected report

Manchester School of Architecture was ranked 7th in the table put together by higher education <u>networking giant QS</u>.

Universities are ranked by QS according to academic reputation, employer reputation and research impact, using surveys, analysis of citations and the impact of published work. Manchester School of Architecture made the top 10, being ranked seventh.

Professor Tom Jefferies, head of Manchester School of Architecture, said he was 'exceptionally pleased' with the result.

'It is recognition of what we are doing, a combination of amazing teaching and research, and our dynamic and progressive relationship with global practices,' he added.

Institutions in Holland, Switzerland, Italy and Singapore also made the top 10, along with Harvard University and the University of California. The University of Sheffield came 30th.

More than 40 countries have establishments in the top 200 places to study building design, according to <u>the report</u>.



Manchester Urban Institute Update

Triangulum: first papers published

<u>Triangulum</u> is a five year €25 million Horizon 2020 project funded by the European Union to demonstrate cutting-edge smart city technologies and roll them out across the globe.

Over a five year period, Triangulum will transform designated urban districts into smart quarters in three 'lighthouse cities': Manchester, Eindhoven (Netherlands) and Stavanger (Norway). Concepts learnt will be transferred to the 'follower cities' of Leipzig (Germany), Prague (Czech Republic) and Sabadell (Spain).
