This is a modern American history lesson for younger secondary students. It will be focused on the Presidency of George W. Bush, looking at the key aspects of his time in office and assessing his legacy, paying special attention to Hurricane Katrina. It will explore Bush's administration through descriptions offered by hip-hop artists, both in music and off-record, therefore demonstrating how the hip-hop community — and by extension, the wider African-American community — regarded Bush. Students will then learn about George W. Bush, the work of some hip-hop artists at the time of his Presidency and the politicised musical response of artists to this particular President.


#### Class content:

- Firstly, students will be asked to look at the album covers on Slide 1. A prize will be awarded to the first person to correctly guess what connects the three albums. Answer: they were all released in the year 2000. 5-10 minutes.
- They will be told the answer also happens to be the year that Bush was elected (shown on Slide 2). In groups, they are to discuss for 5 minutes anything they can immediately share with the class that they know about the ex-President. Sharing will take up to 5 minutes.
- During Slide 3, the teacher will take the time to go through the major events
  of the Bush presidency starting with the controversial election, then going
  on to mention with detail 9/11, the Iraq War, re-election in 2004, Hurricane
  Katrina and the economic downturn in the last two years of his term. 10-15
  minutes.
- Slide 4 shows a still of Kanye West from his famous live NBC moment.
   Students are tested to see if they know the second half of the quote "George

- Bush doesn't care about black people", before asking them why he would have said this. The following slide shows some pictures of Katrina devastation what do they notice about the images? What race are the victims? 5 minutes.
- 5. Explanation of events in Katrina on Slide 6. 5 minutes
- 6. Lil Wayne's 'Georgia... Bush': in groups, study the verse provided in Slide 7. Wayne is from LO, released song 2006. One group focus on theme of 'America' in verse; one group talk about the characters and groups present; one talk about the tone and sentiment. Correction: "fash out" should be "fat shout". Possible things to mention does "in the boot at the bottom" have double meaning? Do the "rappers that helped out... calling y'all" include Kanye if so, do we see solidarity in hip-hop in this moment? Does the racial reference in the song tell us about how black people viewed Bush's Presidency? Including discussion no more than 15 mins.
- 7. Next week: We will be looking closely at George Bush and the Iraq War. For homework, you must select one of the songs from Slide 8, write a paragraph summarising the song's political message and accusations towards Bush include a statistic that supports any of the claims made by the rapper.
- 8. Final slide All these rappers at some point went after Bush, and there are many more. His Presidency, and especially his treatment of Katrina, resulted in widespread musical protest from hip-hop community. Will we see something similar with current administration?




