





Title of Session	Subject Spotlight: Medicine – How to Save a Life						
Description:	In this workshop students will learn about the first aid training provided to medical students to give them a taster of what it is like to study medicine. Students will find out about how medical students are taught to deal with unexpected situations. For example, how to respond to an unresponsive patient and how to deal with someone choking. The session is interactive and requires group work (although this can be completed individually if not possible to work in a group). Please note that this workshop is a higher education subject taster session into medicine and is not formal first aid training.
