Xinhua Chinese Association Dance Group

The Xinhua Chinese Association (XCA) is an independent, non-political, non-religious organisation, mainly based in Manchester which aims to:



- Strengthen friendship among its members
- Protect the interests of members
- Promote Chinese culture
- Promote Sino-British understanding and cultural exchange

Jasmin Dance – Brief Introduction

'Jasmine' is a famous Chinese folk song. The song has a long history and originated in the Qianlong period of the Qing Dynasty. It was originally named 'Flower Tune'.

'Jasmine' was introduced to Europe as early as the 18th century. Later, the tune of this song was written as a Christian hymn, and in 1911 it was selected as 'Ode to the Lord'. From 1920 to 1924, the Italian composer Puccini wrote the tune of this song into his last opera 'Princess Durando', which was widely circulated in the West.

In 1957, the Nanjing Frontline Song and Dance Troupe rearranged it and renamed it 'Jasmine'.

'Jasmine' has a high status in Chinese folk songs. This piece is often played as a piece of folk music performance, and it is more often used by dance lovers dedicated to a folk dance with Southern Yangzi River style.

The fan dance 'Jasmine' was designed and performed by XCA Dance Group.

《茉莉花》是著名中国民歌。该曲 历史久远,最早源于清朝乾隆年 间,初名为《鲜花调》,一直为民 间小调。

《茉莉花》早在十八世纪就开始被传入欧洲,后来這首歌的曲调被写成基督教赞美诗,1911年就已选入《颂主圣名》。1920年至1924年间義大利作曲家普契尼將這首歌的曲調写入他生前最後一部歌劇《杜蘭朵公主》中,并因此在西方广为流传。

1957年,南京前线歌舞团将其重新整理,更名为《茉莉花》。

《茉莉花》在中国民歌中有很高的 地位,这首曲目经常被各民乐队做 为民乐演奏曲目,也更经常被舞蹈 爱好者们用来编排成带有江南风情 的汉民族舞蹈。

我们所表演的团扇舞《茉莉花》就是一个比较典型的江南汉民族舞蹈。

Since its establishment 17 years ago, the choir has participated in various festival celebrations and various occasions in Manchester, spread Chinese culture, sang many popular choral songs, and enjoys a respected reputation in Greater Manchester and across the UK.

Manchester China Institute and Manchester Museum Webinar

Dr Alison Hardie 12:30 pm



This talk explores the relationship between China and Northern Europe from the perspective of plants, gardens, and garden architecture, focusing particularly on Scotland, Sweden, and Russia. The work in Britain of the Scottish-Swedish architect Sir William Chambers (1723-1796) is fairly well known. Less well known is his influence of *chinoiserie* on 18th-century parks and gardens in Scandinavia, where the Swedish royal family created the 'Chinese pavilion' (Kina slott) at Drottningholm, and in Russia, where the Scottish architect Charles Cameron (1745-1812) became a leading exponent of *chinoiserie*. The great Swedish botanist Carl von Linné (1707-1778) also took a deep interest in Chinese plants brought back to Europe, and later, notable plant-hunters in China included George Forrest (1873-1932), whose work led to important collaborations between the Royal Botanic Gardens Edinburgh and botanical institutions in China.

The talk concludes by considering why Scotland and Sweden, two relatively small northern European countries, played such an important role in conveying knowledge of Chinese plants and gardens to the Western world.

Alison Hardie is an Honorary Research Fellow at the University of Leeds, having retired in 2015 as a Senior Lecturer in Chinese Studies. She holds degrees in Classics from the University of Oxford and in Chinese from the University of Edinburgh, and a doctorate from the University of Sussex. Her main research interest is in the social and cultural history of early modern China. She is the translator of Ji Cheng's 17th-century garden manual, The Craft of Gardens (1988, repr. 2012), revised the 3rd edition of Maggie Keswick's The Chinese Garden: History, Art and Architecture (2003), and has written extensively on Chinese garden history. She is currently completing a monograph on the late-Ming poet, playwright and politician Ruan Dacheng (1587- 1646), the original publisher of The Craft of Gardens. A Senior Fellow in Garden and Landscape Studies at Dumbarton Oaks, Washington DC, from 2010 to 2016, she edited The Dumbarton Oaks Anthology of Chinese Garden Literature, published in March 2020.

We will also look back on earlier celebrations of language diversity and collaborations among civic partners in the city.


