
Overview


This 30-minute workshop gives an overview of studying medicine at Manchester. It is geared towards KS3, as it focuses on gaining insight into university and medicine as a subject/career, as opposed to discussing entry requirements/applications. The main focus is to inspire, create interest and show that medicine is an achievable and realistic career goal. The workshop focuses on student life, being a good doctor and some of the main themes of the course, e.g. clinical skills.

At several points in the recording, there is a short activity/discussion for the young people taking part in the workshop. This will require the teacher/supervisor to pause the recording whilst there is a short discussion. These pauses are outlined in the guidance below and are stated in the recording. The students will benefit from having a pen and paper ready for these sections.


