2. New/revised policies or procedures

• Evidence required to accompany academic appeals

The Teaching and Learning Strategic Group (TLSG) have agreed the following form of words that should be used by colleagues to clarify the need for evidence for students submitting Academic Appeals this Semester.

"We have reconsidered the requirement for students to provide medical evidence to support Academic Appeals for the rest of the 2020/21 academic year. This reflects the fact that students may find it difficult to obtain GP appointments during the current situation.

Students appealing on the grounds that there were circumstances affecting their performance must provide credible and compelling reasons (supported by appropriate documentary evidence) to explain why this information was not made available prior to the decision being made. Students will need to explain why they did not bring the mitigating circumstances to the University's attention at an earlier stage.

Academic Appeals relating to medical issues/illness should where possible provide supplementary medical evidence to support the appeal as it may assist the retrospective consideration of such cases. However, case handlers should also note that students may have found it difficult to obtain GP appointments during the pandemic and medical evidence was not routinely obtained from students where requests for mitigation were submitted at the time."

2. New/revised policies or procedures (continued)

This message has been reflected in an updated version of the <u>Guidance for staff on Mitigating Circumstances</u>, <u>Self-Certification of Absence</u>, <u>Academic Appeals and Automatic Extensions relating to Covid-19 (Coronavirus)</u>, <u>2020/21</u>, which is available on our <u>Additional policy guidance</u> in response to the Coronavirus outbreak web page.

3. Policy/procedure updates from other areas of the University

• Academic Malpractice Procedure

The Academic Malpractice Procedure (owned by the Division of Campus Life) has recently been revised and is now available:

 Student Recruitment, Selection and Admissions Policy – updates and request to use new wording in exit letters issued by Schools

The Student Recruitment, Selection and Admissions Policy (owned by Student Admissions, Administration and Business Improvement) has recently had a few minor revisions made to it, primarily to update out of date information, along with small additional statements being added to strengthen certain areas.

One of the new additions is around students who have previously been exited from a programme due to academic failure, applying for the same programme again:

"Students who have previously been exited from a programme on academic grounds will not normally be made any further offers on the same programme of study, unless very exceptional circumstances apply. Applicants would be expected to identify in their application that they had previously been exited on academic grounds and provide information and/or evidence to the relevant admissions team accounting for issues which had previously impacted on academic attainment. Such cases would be considered at the discretion of the Academic School."

Following on from this new statement, it is recommended that Schools use the same form of wording in any exit letters they issue to students who are being exited early from their programme due to academic failure, so that the same message is issued across the institution in relation to such instances.


5. Institute of Teaching and Learning
