

Event Support


- The Engagement & External Relations Team organise annual public lectures and impactful events. Examples:

Justice Hub

Developing Law students' employability skills and providing access to justice for vulnerable people

The challenge

For the most vulnerable people in Greater Manchester and further afield, cuts to legal aid have meant that they have nowhere left to go for legal advice. This means that people cannot effectively claim and enforce their legal rights. Problems can escalate and lead to profound consequences for individuals, such as homelessness, high levels of debt, being prevented from seeing their children, or being separated from their families. This has a significant human cost for the individuals themselves, and a wider cost to society as other services have to take the strain of supporting people whose problems have spiralled out of control.

With increasing demands from law firms for students with a range of experience and employability skills, there is a crucial need for students to gain clinical legal education. This can ensure they are amongst the strongest candidates when applying for training contacts. However, students from poorer socio-economic backgrounds often lack the contacts that can open doors to a law career, leading to a lack of diversity and social mobility in the legal sector, with the highest proportion of senior positions being filled by people from more affluent backgrounds.

Our approach

At The University of Manchester, our students get the best possible start to their legal careers with a wealth of opportunities to explore various arms of the law via our Justice Hub network.

Our law students are provided with holistic, autonomous and reflective experiences, helping them to develop their values, ethics and civic engagement. Our Justice Hub epitomises this approach and consists of a range of projects to enable a transformational impact on a local and global scale.

The Justice Hub provides students with the best possible start to their legal careers via our award-winning Legal Advice Centre (LAC). Students are given the opportunity to provide free legal advice to members of the public who are not able to access this advice elsewhere.

At the LAC students are introduced to the practical application of the law and to using legal knowledge in real life situations. We seek to ensure that our students are trained to deliver at a high standard in terms of their professional ethics, legal research and interview skills. They learn how to carry out legal work on a similar basis to a solicitors' firm. They also work closely with practising solicitors and barristers and gain an insight into the life of a lawyer. This taste of legal casework makes a crucial contribution to their future career prospects.

Within the Justice Hub we are also working with international partners on the California Innocence Project, helping secure freedom for prisoners who have been wrongfully convicted of serious crimes, and who in some cases are facing death sentences.

The University of Manchester is the only Russell Group University to include social responsibility as one of its strategic priorities. The work of the Justice Hub is an important part of this commitment.



How you can support us

Legal Advice Centre

We are seeking philanthropic support to provide talented law students with the opportunity to take part in summer placements at our Legal Advice Centre. This would enable students to receive a full, in-depth experience of advising clients from disadvantaged backgrounds on a daily basis during the summer break. It would also mean we can run a full programme of clients who have suffered from legal aid cuts and are currently having to face the court system without legal representation, whilst facing opponents who have instructed barristers.

California Innocence Project

We are seeking support to provide students with the exciting opportunity to travel to the United States for a period of 6-8 weeks to take part in the California Innocence Project. Students would be given the experience of providing legal support to wrongly convicted prisoners, which could ultimately lead to their release.
