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
Main goals of the Institute



Ageing Research Themes for MICRA Afflicted Research

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
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MICRA

- Cross-faculty institutional network for supporting interdisciplinary ageing research at UoM (established 2010)
- Supported by director, deputy and codirectors and cross-faculty management committee
- 300 affiliated researchers within UoM
- In the period August 2018 June 2020, 130
 new grant awards involving MICRA
 members
- International collaborations with European and North American universities
- Strong emphasis on sociological aspects of ageing relating to class, ethnicity and gender. Particular interest in ageing in socially excluded communities and groups
