For many this was their first archive trip and as History students, meant that it was the first time they saw the 'stuff' of their subject. It was also a unique perspective into collections on Black and global majority collections. It was also an eye-opener for many of the students in regards to the archival practice and the significance of decolonised vs colonialist methods of doing this.

The students found the materials surprising and have remarked on how they shifted entirely their preconceptions of Moss Side and Black communities in Manchester. A few students have already stated their intention to return to the archive to carry out further research related to my module, and their dissertations.

Diversifying and Decolonising our collections

- Lack of intersectionality
- Lack of synergy between the archive and library collections
- The importance of the oral tradition and storytelling isn't reflected





Diversifying and Decolonising our collections

Process

- Focusing on UK history, culture and identity, race theory and gender initially
- Auditing collections to examine who is writing what we hold and whether they are well placed to do so
- Looking for gaps in subject areas and checking whether there is fair representation amongst the topics and themes
- Collaborating with ICP students

Intended outcomes

- ensure that the library remains diverse, relevant and current
- ensure that the library holdings reflect and complement our archive holdings
- ensure the collections reflect and support our vision, mission and values as an organisation working towards a fairer and more just society.
