#BeeWell finds LGBT+ inequalities in adolescent wellbeing

In autumn 2021, nearly 40,000 young people from across Greater Manchester were surveyed to ask about their wellbeing, and the <u>#BeeWell</u> research team have released some of their initial findings:

- Only 7% of boys report a high level of emotional difficulties, compared with 22% of girls and 50% of non-binary young people.
- Gay, lesbian, bi and pansexual young people scored, on average, less than 5 out of 10 on our life satisfaction measure, compared to around 7 out of 10 for their heterosexual peers.

In a recent Policy@Manchester blog Professor Neil Humphrey, academic lead for #BeeWell, reflects on this analysis of wellbeing inequalities for young people across Greater Manchester, and considers how they should be addressed.

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Strengthening participation and people power in Greater Manchester

To support the Greater Manchester Independent Inequalities Commission's recommendation to pivot towards people power and the Greater Manchester Strategy commitment to achieving equity and tackling inequality through a distributed leadership model, Policy@Manchester worked with GMCA to organise a workshop earlier this year.

The workshop brought together key stakeholders to consider the principles which should inform participation, to map existing participation structures and processes and to identify good practice. Attendees from across all ten boroughs in Greater Manchester included executive members with responsibility for equalities, Chairs from the Equality Panels, stakeholders from the voluntary sector, and public service officers.

We have now released a <u>report written by Professor Francesca Gains and Professor Liz Richardson</u>, the lead academics on this project. The report draws on discussions within Greater Manchester and examples of best practice elsewhere. It sets out key principles to underpin greater pluralism in policymaking, maps out the different ways in which participation can take place, and makes suggestions for strengthening participation.

Current and upcoming areas of work

We are currently working on policy activities and resources on the following themes.

- Energy Futures
- On Space
- Too close to the sun: the health benefits and economic case for banning sunbeds
- The role of R&D in the levelling up agenda
