Assessment

This module has only one formal assessment but requires all the 'formative' assessments to be completed. The idea behind the formative assessment is that these are the building blocks of the beginning of your written thesis work. Hence, it is critical that they be completed on time. They are 'formative' in the sense that we will be discussing these in class and hence you will get help from one another. They will also be shared with your supervisory team. Even if they are not 'polished' pieces of work, the idea is that they are to be 'completed' as part of the process.

Each component of this work has a focus — What, Why, How — that ultimately will look like the beginning of your thesis. Some examples will be given in class and the point is to get you writing and also to generate clarity.

The assignments are due on the morning of the class, by 10:00AM, UK time (where the session will be in the afternoon). You are to upload your assignment on blackboard plus also email a copy to me (Timothy.Devinney@manchester.ac.uk). I will then distribute all of them at the beginning of the class for discussion and feedback. The length is a suggestion. You can write less to start but should not write more than specified.
