

Careers Guide for PGT Academic Advisors

Your role as an Academic Advisor can be very influential in supporting students' career questions. Insightful questioning alongside timely signposting to the right resources (via the links below,) can really help motivate students to take action.

Three questions to prompt students during an Academic Advising session (relevant to all postgraduates)

Encourage students to check eligibility for work experience opportunities; some are aimed at Undergraduates.

1. What activities have you been involved with outside your course?

Encourage attendance to career and employer events plus participation in extracurricular activities:

- Find part time work, internships and all careers events on CareerConnect: careerconnect.manchester.ac.uk
- Volunteer Hub: find-volunteering.manchester.ac.uk
- Positions of responsibility e.g. societies, student representative, opportunities with your course.
- Develop transferable skills through new activities: careers.manchester.ac.uk/findjobs/skills/

2. What career paths have you explored so far?

Do students enjoy working alone or collaboratively? Do they prefer to learn through reading and research, or through doing? Encourage students to be their own 'Careers Researcher.' This can take time, careful reflection and a mixture of;

- Starting to research career options via: prospects.ac.uk and careers.manchester.ac.uk/whichcareer/
- Accumulating experience and having a go (see section 1)
- Talking to people! Meet alumni and employers at careers events and create a LinkedIn profile: careers.manchester.ac.uk/applicationsinterviews/linkedin

3. Have you used the Careers Service yet?

Please encourage students to think about what stage they are at in exploring, preparing or applying for jobs. Students can rate their career readiness in CareerConnect, which can allow for relevant messages to be shared through the year. If students are feeling unsure about what to do, feel overwhelmed by options, or have questions about career paths, please refer them to book a Careers guidance meeting. We provide impartial, objective, and expert advice. We can help with every step of the recruitment process with our resources listed below:

- **Get in touch:** students can visit us in the Atrium, 1st Floor University Place, attend our Humanities Careers Dropins (see CareerConnect under Events), use the 'questions' button on CareerConnect, and our <u>live web chat</u>
- CareerConnect is where students can book Careers meetings and Getting Started appointments (including appointments for students with a disability or health concern), applications advice and interview simulations. Additional pointers for PGT students

- Graduate schemes are open to Postgraduate students. They require high quality applications from September,
 with most organisations having rolling deadlines (which close when full). These schemes are highly competitive
 with approximately 10-12% of graduates undertaking them (can also apply for these after graduation). Many get
 their first graduate role with a small to medium sized business, or larger organisations without a formal graduate
 scheme, applying in semester two.
